The day was warm and sunny when Sherman countians began gathering at DeMoss Springs Park, the men to sit and visit while the women opened the baskets of food—a situation constituting a luxury for men. There was food, tables full of it, enough to tickle the thin and frustrate the thick.

The program began promptly on time because some wanted to attend a wedding and others wanted to see a horse show. Tom Fraser sang three songs, more than his usual quota, and closed with "Sweet Oregon", Mrs. Allie Ruggles read the report of secretary and treasurer, Wallace May extended the president's welcome, Giles French talked about some history, Kenneth Fridley gave some state highway commission history and prophesied great development for this area in the next few years.



Sig Unander, state treasurer, scorned the politicians practice of talking long and saying nothing. After some early day history of Oregon and some kind words for its sturdy founders he urged study and acceptance of the proposed regional corporation for Columbia river development as a means of getting rid of the iniquitous preference clause and putting northwest development in the hands of natives instead of strangers.

Elected as new officers after Don Martin had reported for the nominating committee were: Carroll Sayers, president, Mrs. Nellie Fields, vice-president, Wallace May, director, Giles French, historian. Term of the first two is two years and for the last two, five years.

Hearing Uncovers Large Objections to Bridge Plan

A large number of interested persons crowded the hearing hall at Maryhill castle Tuesday morning and sat surrounded by relics of an old Indian civilization while talking about transportation problems not imagined by the aborigines.

Colonel Jackson Graham dispensed with formalities by briefing the attendants in the purpose of the hearing which was to determine whether the bridge plans would impede river transportation. Charles E. Andrews, of the Washington Toll Bridge authority said that the bridge as planned would have two 12 foot lanes, and walks, would be a low level bridge with a lift span that would be 250 feet horizontal and 68 feet vertical clearance.

Paul W. Lite for Upper River Towing, Wheeler Rucker, for Tidewater-Shaver and Antony Smith for Stevenson Towboat, asked that there be a minimum of 300 foot horizontal clearance and 75 feet vertical clearance. They all preferred a high level bridge without a lift span.

H. C. Higgins of the toll bridge authority, said that while the plans for the bridge permitted some variation in location of the lift span, such a design would permit shipping satisfactorily. Cost of the bridge as planned would be \$2,875,000 and as requested would be \$3,615,000 with financing charges in addition. The traffic count indicated that between three and three and a half million could be spent with financial safety.

Herbert K. West of the Inland Navigation spoke about the cost and delay that might be involved in a lift span, but his evidence was controverted as far as the Hood River bridge was concerned. The lift span there is used about five times a year.

Fritz Timmin of the Portland Public Docks backed the contention of the barge lines. Speaking for the bridge were George Bacon, owner of the Maryhill ferry, Henry Miller, Klickitat county commissioner, Glen Wood, Wenatchee Chamber of Commerce, Bill Haskins, The Dalles Chamber of Commerce, Jack Rogers, Wenatchee Traffic Ass'n, Ben Fanning, Bend, president of the Caribou Trail Ass'n., Al Henry, Washington state senator.

The crowd came because of interest in the bridge and was representative of many of the communities from Columbia river to Wentachee along Highway 97, which is the Caribou Trail.

Attending from Sherman county were Judge Vernon Miller, B. H. Roberson, T. Lester Johnson Robert Ferrell and Giles French.

Red Cross Swimming Lesson To Start
