Savings bonds sales for the state of Oregon through May amounted to \$16,188,957, 1.3% higher than a year ago in face of a drop in Oregon sales for May to \$2,799,516 from the previous year's \$3,085,531.

County sales for the year were \$49,990 to \$32,445 for 1957.
