SURPLUS

The state is expected to have \$30,000,000 in the sock at the end of the biennium. That means that it collected that amount more than was necessary from the population in what some will call a depression year and which certainly would have been if all taxes were so unrestrained.

The legislature boosted the state's take from citizens so high and so far above the campaign issue of 45 per cent that a special session was called to lower it. Republicans increased the governor's rather modest estimate of how much could be cut and still there is \$30,000,000 in the sock.

There's no need to exult about it. It will be spent and probably a great deal more because the taxpayers stood still for enough taxes to raise needs plus \$30,000,000 so maybe legislators could levy a little more to give to some begging group.

THE USES OF POWER

In every country some individual or some group has the ultimate power. During the course of history it has been the chief or King, the medicine men or priests, different sort of groups: the learned, the ruthless, the moneyed men, the gangsters.

Eventually final power rests with people because they are the most numerous always and when they choose to rebel or just not mind no governing body can do much about it. In a representative republic such as we have, power presumably resides in the people but they seldom make use of it, giving vent to opinions in election years and then often without considered thought on the subjects at hand.

Whoever has the power there are numerous ways to use it. Sometimes the ruler governs thru fear and some of that is present in all governments, fear of going to jail, fear of being fined or otherwise punished. There is a general theory that eventually man will become so civilized that he can be governed merely by respect for the law and the rights of

others. This theory suffers every time a new law is passed with punishment provided because every punitive law is a step backward in our slow and perhaps futile labors toward civilization. The citizen more particularly in countries where people have delegated power in small amounts and reluctantly, feels that it is his right to oppose unpopular laws. The prohibition law is an example.

It has always been impossible to organize men into large units for purposes of government. That is a fault of Russian government and is getting to be a fault of our own. Different customs, different conditions, make different rules necessary. It seems probable that the south will have to work out its racial problem; the meddling of the north seems not to be helpful. Neither is it necessary to have many general laws; the smaller the governmental unit the more satisfactorily it can govern. That is the reason for interest in strengthening county government.

New men in government too often use force while older heads with more experience are able to cajole citizens into compliance with an accepted code.

It is a problem that is always with us, no matter what party or what form of government. Using power is the art of politics. Too few politicians are artists but are rough, tough men spoiled by the gift of temporary power. They do more to slow down the trend toward power by consent than any other group.

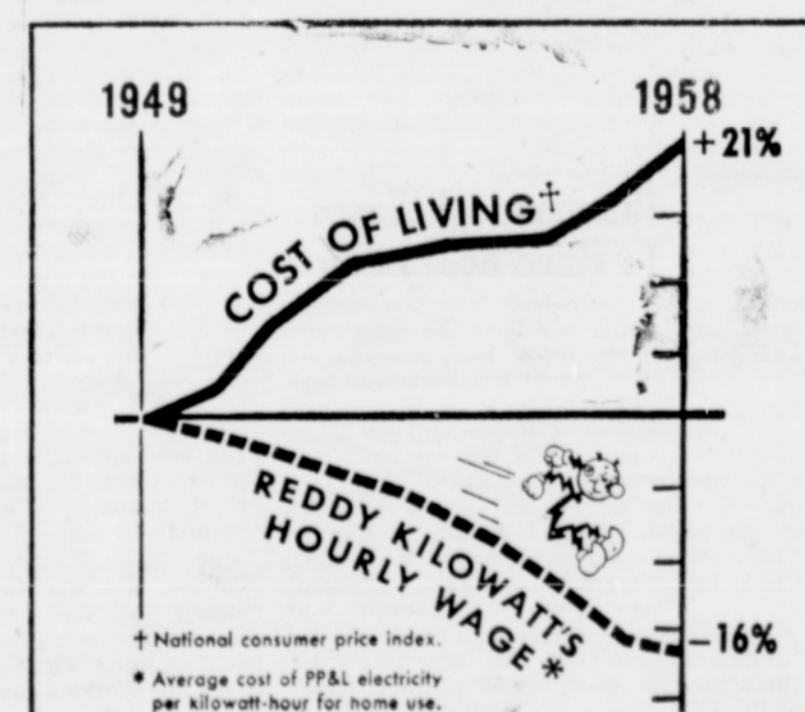
