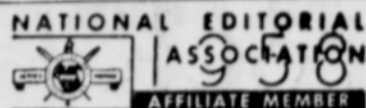

HIGHWAY ACCIDENTS

Americans did rather well over the Labor day holiday according to observation and reports. Something like 400 were killed which is a small number when it is considered that actually millions of cars, many of them full of people were on the highways. There is no other vehicle that so many could have used with so few deaths. If the roads had been filled with a like number of buggies pulled by horses the deaths would have been ten times as many.

It is our opinion that Americans do a fine job driving their cars with safety. Some are killed every day—about 100—and these are often the more careless drivers whose elimination in some violent accident is a certainty at some time. The natural processes should gradually improve the quality of drivers by removing the more reckless.

The careful may be killed in highway accidents but this is usually the fault of the careless. The point is that those with faulty judgment, those of violent anger, those with inattentive habits are being killed faster than the better balanced.

A writer in Fortune defends the automobile as a saver of many more lives than it takes and this is undoubtedly true. Certainly man handles automobiles with more safety than he handles anything else. Certain, also, is the fact that some will be killed in any sort of transportation.

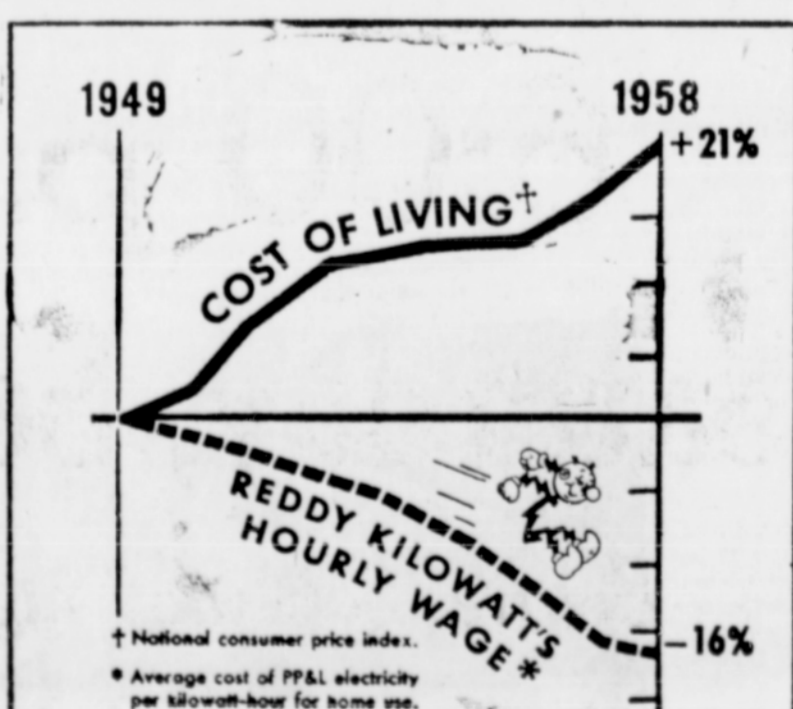
