FRIDAY:

This is the day for judging so that when Saturday comes and the bigger crowds, the ribbons will be placed so the spectator can tell which is best of the show. There will be crowds Friday, too, because so many like to watch the judging of 4-H stock—very interesting.

SATURDAY:

This is a big day at the fair. The judging will continue into the morning if not finished Friday. At 12:45 the program will begin with the Style Revue in front of the grandstand and the horsemen of the county will put on a horseshow in the arena or on the track. It will include contests such as scurry, barrel race and pole bending and judging for horsemanship by three classes of youngsters.

At six o'clock the 4-H and FFA livestock will be sold at auction which will include 87 head of swine, sheep and steers. Customers will be able to buy their winter's meat and arrange to have it killed and frozen all at one deal. nffl flf

At 7:30 in the evening the first rodeo under the lights for Sherman county will start with Harley Tucker's rodeo outfit putting on the show.

SUNDAY:

The program will start at one o'clock with the livestock parade which brings winners of the open class and youth activity groups before the grandstand for display.

Following that event will be the grand entry in the arena and the start of the rodeo which will have new horses and bulls brought from Pendleton after end of the Round-Up.

Five acts will be interspersed between rodeo events including the Rudenko Bros. jugglers; the Lane sisters, who are tumblers and trampoline workers, Johnny Lindsay, clown, Dwight Moore's mongred revue and Paul Cavanaugh who overcomes his frustration by throwing knives at his wife.
