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HUNTING PRESERVE

Red Hat day is being somewhat overshadowed this year by an announcement that certain land owners in central Oregon will permit hunting on their lands only on payment of a fee of \$25, the money to be used to pay damages and police the property.

Red Hat days have been widely advertised recently because they are a part of a program to lessen land owner opposition to hunters and to educate hunters to better conduct afield. They serve an excellent purpose.

It may well be that the proposal of pay for hunting rights is the start of a great change in hunting. Despite Red Hat days many stockmen lose cattle from hunting mistakes and are resentful of it. Now a small group has said they would permit hunting for a fee. It is possible and legal.

There is no reason why land owners cannot increase the fee until they derive a sizeable income from the deer they feed throughout the year. They would not mind doing that. Hunters feel that the deer are public property and should be available to be who can shoot them. They even feel in some cases that they are entitled to hunt where they please in the pursuit of this public game.

Should the principle of pay for hunting become common the hunter will have lost his argument.

SHERMAN ADAMS

The resignation of Sherman Adams could not have been a surprise to any regular reader of the public prints. We are among those who feel that Mr. Adams was an honest man who did no wrong. We are also of the opinion that Mr. Adams was a prize booby to ever become involved with such a cheap name dropper as Mr. Goldfine. The Adams resignation was a foregone conclusion.

Whether it will help the Republican party is not our concern. Mr. Adams has been one of that party's members who was willing to compromise with the new deal tendencies in our politics, to go along with more and more government in order to compete with the social minded of the nation. His going is not a personal loss to us.

But we do think that it may be a loss to the nation. If every public servant must literally live in a goldfish bowl with the daily papers interested in his every action, his breakfast menu, his investments and his friends, we are going to find it difficult to get able men to take any government jobs whatever. We will be turning the government over to the little and petty, to those of neither ability nor pride.

A public servant, it appears, may be turned out of office without trial other than by politicians and newspapers. His guilt need not be proven, only suspicion aroused. If that be the case the nation has lost much more than Mr. Adams has lost. It has lost the potential services of the bold and the able. No man can do a good job digging a ditch if he be subjected to every unkind word, and feels that he must change his style of pace to suit every criticism. Public work is more onerous than ditch digging and if the public has no confidence in its servants the country is in danger.

LEGISLATIVE PAY

A bite of a furore has been kicked up this week over Measure No. 3 on the November ballot which would raise the pay of state legislators from \$600 to \$1200 per year.

As a straight deal that isn't so bad. It costs legislators money to go to Salem and it costs more to run around the district and explain to voters what happened. Voters will realize that there is no assurance of increased quality with increased pay. We prefer to elect men who have made enough of a success at something that they can afford to spend some money at being a representative.

tative. But the furore was aroused by something else. It was discovered that the legislators who wrote the bill deleted a phrase that, if the measure is passed, would give the legislature the right to vote themselves an expense account. Those who read the explanation in the Voters' Pamphlet will find that explained.

Oregon citizens, usually generous would not mind raising the pay of their legislators by a definite and stated amount. They will object to putting their stamp of approval on a measure that would permit legislators to vote an unnamed sum for expenses.

HIGH SCHOOL ADDITION

The Sherman high school board has made little or no campaign for passage of its proposal for \$80,000 for building additional classrooms. The election is to be held next Wednesday, October 1.

There is no doubt that an addition, or perhaps more than one, will have to be made soon if the school is to remain standard. It was built for three districts and is now serving five. If the John Day dam brings any great number of high school pupils the school will be too full for efficient teaching.

We are getting more numerous here in Sherman county as far as the school age population is concerned. Starting from grade 12 the number in different classes is 23, 37, 44 and 36 and even the 36 in the freshman class is a 50 per cent increase over the 23 seniors.

In the grades the numbers (beginning with the 8th) shows 40, 47, 50, 46, 58, 40, 55 and 60. That means that when pupils now in the first four grades are in high school there will be 213 of them. We think the chances of increase are greater than those for decrease.

Whether citizens want to build or not isn't the question so much as when they will build if a standard school is to be maintained.

Livestockmen Have Finance Problems

The livestock committee asked the department to prepare several reports for the association meeting: a fiscal analysis and comparison of the Oregon livestock brand inspection program's 1957 and 1958 receipts, an estimate of savings possible if clearance of out-of-state cattle were dropped from the program, a report on savings possible through changing inspection methods at federal posted markets and a study on possible savings by charging individual stockmen for mileage on point of origin inspections and estray investigations.

The advisory committee also recommended that the livestock brand re-recording fee be left at \$5 for a five-year period, the brand re-recording fee when the brand owner uses the same design on cattle and horses be \$8 instead of \$10, the law be changed to require a \$10 fee for a new brand re-recording and \$5 for a brand transfer.
