Mrs. E. E. Barnum left Thursday for Portland to spend a few days with her daughter, Mrs. Robert Jones and family.

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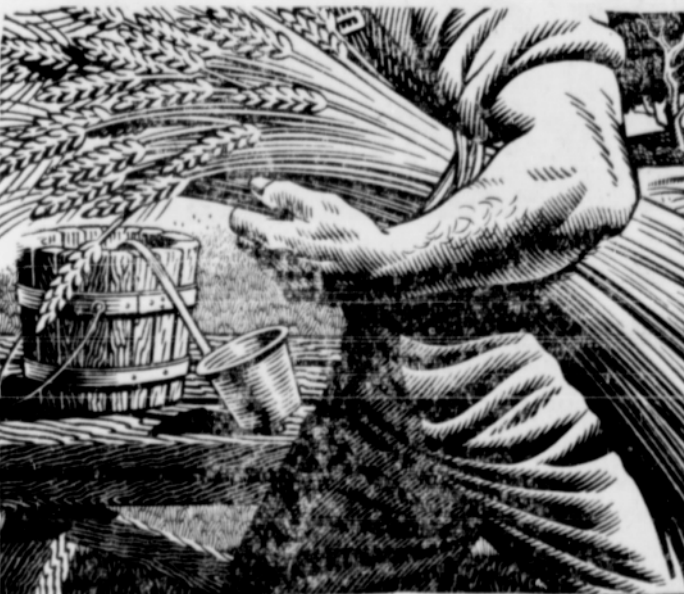
