man's product. Each rancher should be familiar with these to insure himself of a proper return for animal sold. Price is the first bargaining point and has influencing factors of grades, cost of selling, and distance from markets. The second bargaining point used is shrinkage. This includes natural and pencil shrinkage. Cutback of off grade animals is also a bargaining point. A buyer may ask for a 10% sort on any group of cattle he purchases. Cutbacks bring lower prices and increase shrinkage. While sorting animals, they shrink about 1% every half-hour.

Wheat Breeding

Improved wheat varieties have increased the State's wealth by many millions of dollars over the past 25-30 years. The cereal breeding and varietal testing project serves as an example of how research can benefit Oregon agriculture. The Sherman branch experiment station is one of 13 of the Oregon agricultural experiment stations which serve Oregon. One of the main functions of the station is to develop or breed and test new varieties. Station Superintendent W. E. Hall, has estimated increased wheat produced over Bluestem in

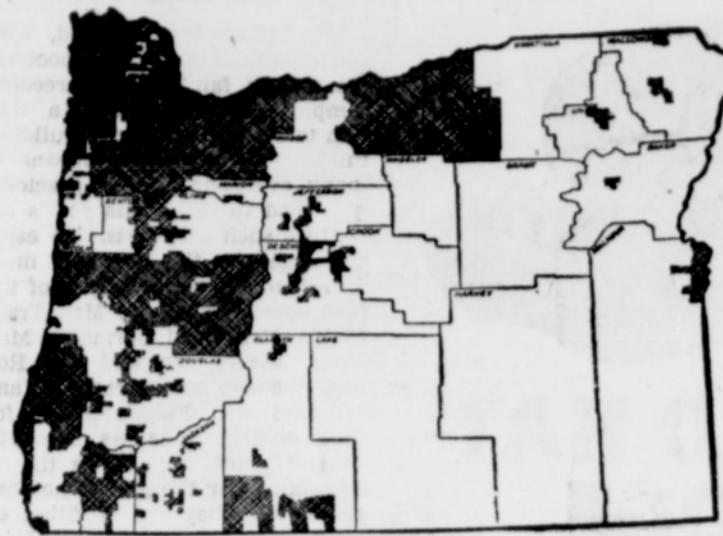

Boundaries of all livestock districts in the state were determined in a series of hearings recently concluded by the state department of agriculture. Information on all the livestock districts in Oregon is now available from the central depository at the department's headquarters in Salem.

the Columbia Basin due to improved varieties.

Original settlers in the Columbia Basin brought along a variety known as Bluestem. Today, varieties developed and tested by the experiment station yield 25 to 75 per cent more than Bluestem. Varieties Golden, Federation, Elgin, Rex and Columbia were developed or introduced by Oregon experiment stations. Increased annual production due to varietal improvement by Oregon wheat breeders is estimated at 1,450,000 bushels for 1957. At \$2 per bushel this added \$2,900,000 to state wealth and helped keep Oregon wheat growers in a competitive position.

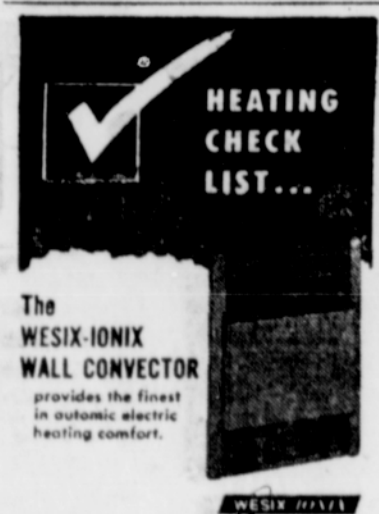
