Cancer Workers Go To Portland Meeting

Mrs. Bennie Payne of Grass Valley, volunteer worker for the American Cancer Society, Mrs. Keith McDonald, chairman of the Wasco area and Mrs. Frank von Borstel, county chairman, attended the annual meeting of the society in Portland Friday and Saturday. They reported that prominent doctors conducting a panel of questions and answers were unanimous in their opinion that there is no substitute at present for frequent health check up with reputable physicians, early diagnosis and treatment. Research is being carried on to discover a vaccine and curative drugs, some of which help but to date none have been perfected which can completely cure cancer without the use of surgery, radium or x-ray.
 Mr. Francis Lindaman, director from New York City, stated that cancer strikes two out of three homes in the nation and is the single greatest killer of children. That in addition to other research the American Cancer Society spends more for research in leukemia than any other organization except the federal government. He also stated that altho the society is stressing education that we are now losing 80,000 persons who could be cured by the methods we now have.
