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MARK HATFIELD

It is our carefully considered opinion that Mark Hatfield should be elected governor. He is much the freer candidate, freer from connections that would influence his judgement during his office. Although friendly to labor he is not supported by labor leaders, nor would he be obedient to them.

Hatfield is the son of a railroad worker, a graduate of Willamette university where he taught after service in the navy during the war. He became dean of men, entered the legislature and was elected secretary of state. His rise has been rapid and he has been criticised for moving too fast. But we need young men who move fast; there is always a surplus of those who advance slowly.

Oregon faces some serious times. We have spent all the money that hard working tax committees could raise for several years. Hatfield will listen to pleas of economy and he has no grandiose schemes for boosting the budget on behalf of any group of people.

Hatfield is not an intense partisan and neither are the majority of Oregon voters. He aspires to be governor of all the people and responsive to all the people, not a half nor one group.

THE MEASURES

The measures on the ballot next week have not been extensively discussed hereabouts and a quick brush over may be helpful. These are our personal opinions.

No. 1. Fixing state boundaries. Establishes Commission to set boundary between Oregon and Washington. May be necessary and shouldn't be too expensive. YES

No. 2. Increasing Veterans' Loan Funds. Increasing assessment figures make the extra two percent in this bill unnecessary. NO

No. 3. Salaries of State Legislators. Contains provision for expense money without limitation. Public service should be service, not paid job. NO

No. 4. Capital Punishment. We think the state seldom if ever executes a man who doesn't need it. NO

No. 5. Financing Urban Development. For cities, not the country. Might help. YES

No. 6. Modifying County Debt Limit. Sensible. YES

No. 7. Special Grand Jury. Two grand juries might cause a lot of trouble. It might require much later legislation. NO

No. 8. Authorizing Different Use of State Institution. Gives board of control authority to terminate use of institutions outside Marion county after ten years. Taxpayers will be better served by keeping institutions in one place. NO

No. 9. Temporary Appointment of Judges. Has opposition but courts are far behind, appeals being made to obtain delay. Not full solution, but should help. YES

No. 10. State Power Development. It hasn't a friend. NO

No. 11. County Home Rule. YES YES

No. 12. Authorizes discontinuing State TB hospitals. YES

No. 13. Persons Eligible To Serve in Legislature. Bad title. Teachers can now serve in legislature. This gives them right to collect two pay checks. Disrupts constitutional principles about division of powers. Bad bill. NO NO

VAN OF HISTORY

DRY FALL

Farmers who tried to put their grain down to moisture were no more than partly successful as the spotted stands show. Except in the north end the fields look ragged and farmers say they may have to reseed in the spring. Those seeding now are putting their grain into the ground as shallow as possible.

It has been years since so poor a fall for seeding wheat has occurred although old timers can remember when they were common. Seeding in the dust was once a risky venture that sometimes paid off; most farmers waited for rains even if they did not come until late November.

It could be that our luck is running out, that in some way we have leaked from God's pocket, and will have less advantageous conditions than have prevailed for almost twenty years. Such a thing would be deplorable but is certain to happen sometime. Let us hope that a dry spell, if it does come, will not last as long as has the wet cycle.

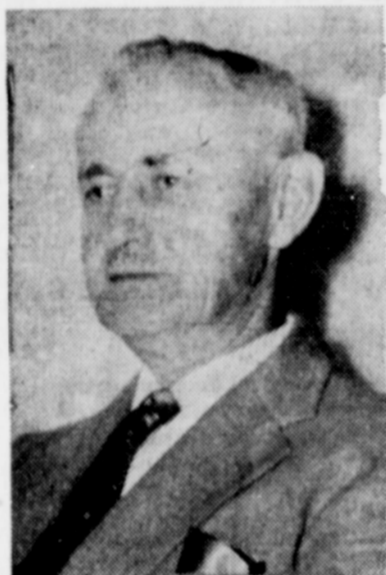
