Stock Owners May Pick Location For Brands

Owners of horses, mules and cattle recording new brands may choose from six locations—either right or left hip, right or left rib or right or left shoulder. This is in line with the state department of agriculture's regulation enacted as a result of 1957 changes in the livestock brand law.

Owners of sheep, goats, hogs, poultry and foxes may also record brands, but they are not restricted as to location.

The brands may be either a design impressed by an iron or made by use of caustic chemicals, paint or tattoo.

Grain Treating

HCB is the recommended seed treatment material for control of smut on fall sown wheat. HCB has been available as a 40% material, but is now coming on the market as an 80% product. Caution should be taken as to direction in use of the later material.

Seed treatment results at the Smut Research Lab., Pullman, indicate an ounce per bushel of either material is needed to get proper coverage. Therefore, the 80% product should not be used since it will increase the cost unless 2 ounces or more are desired. One ounce of 40% is generally sufficient. If a higher concentration is desired it is suggested 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 ounces of 40% material be used.

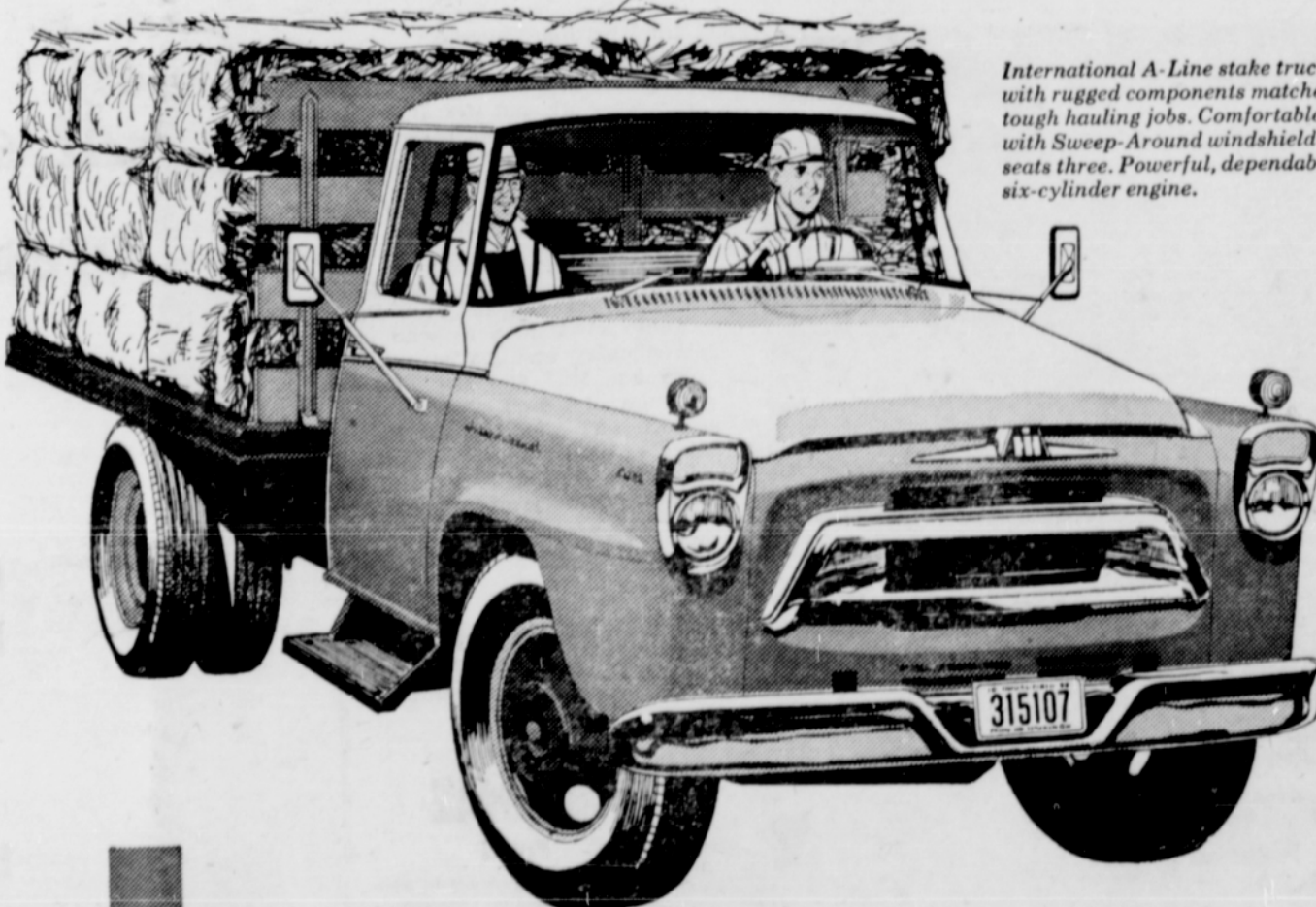
