MILK STORED HERE

Between 3000 to 4000 carloads of Milo—not a kernel of which was grown in Oregon—is presently in terminal storage in Portland awaiting world-wide shipment, the state department of agriculture reported Friday.

Almost entirely from the Great Plains, these thousands of tons of Milo, a grain sorghum, are being stored in Oregon under U. S. government direction for further transfer.

Almost equaling Oregon's wheat inspections, the division of grain inspection of the state department of agriculture reports 3,053,286 bushels of Milo inspected in November as compared with 3,505,251 bushels of wheat for the same period.
