Sherrie Fraser, 17, of Moro, merited state honors in the 4-H Clothing program for her sewing ability. Award donor was Coats and Clark.

Miss Fraser received county top awards on all projects exhibited including grand champion awards. She also became a skillful judge, winning many honors.

Members of her own club, Sew-It's-Fun, became as enthusiastic as she was in exhibiting and modeling garments under her watchful coaching.

Garden Expert
Jack and his giant bean stalks had nothing on Robert Youngman, 18, of McMinnville, when it comes to growing vegetables.

As winner in the 4-H Garden program he received a congress trip from Allis-Chalmers.

An Oregon State College freshman with nine years in 4-H Club work, Youngman has planted 35,000 sq. ft. of garden. He has presented many exhibits and demonstrations.

Youngman has held several offices in his local club and has been vice president and reporter for the Yamhill County 4-H Council. He is junior leader of the Meat Growers 4-H Club and belongs to the Cloverleaves Junior Leaders Club.

The Youngman family boasts a total of 29 years in 4-H work, counting Robert's older brother, his sister, and his mother, who is the local club leader.

New Swine Project

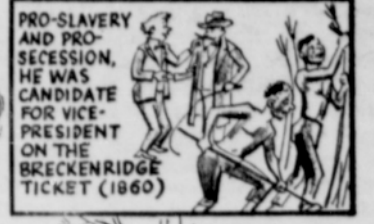
