Oregon In History

February 15, 1841 — Ewing Young who came to this country with Mr. Hall J. Kelley, died today at his home at Wheatland. Mr. Young has been most active in the affairs of this area. He was an organizer of the Willamette Cattle Company and led the party that drove cattle north overland from California. Three years ago he built a sawmill. His death creates legal problems since, if his estate is to be probated, it will be necessary to set up some sort of provisional government.

February 17, 1899 — Wheeler county was today created by the state legislature. It was named for Henry H. Wheeler who came to Oregon in 1862 and has since turned his hand to driving stage, farming and stock raising. Mr. Wheeler was one of the most

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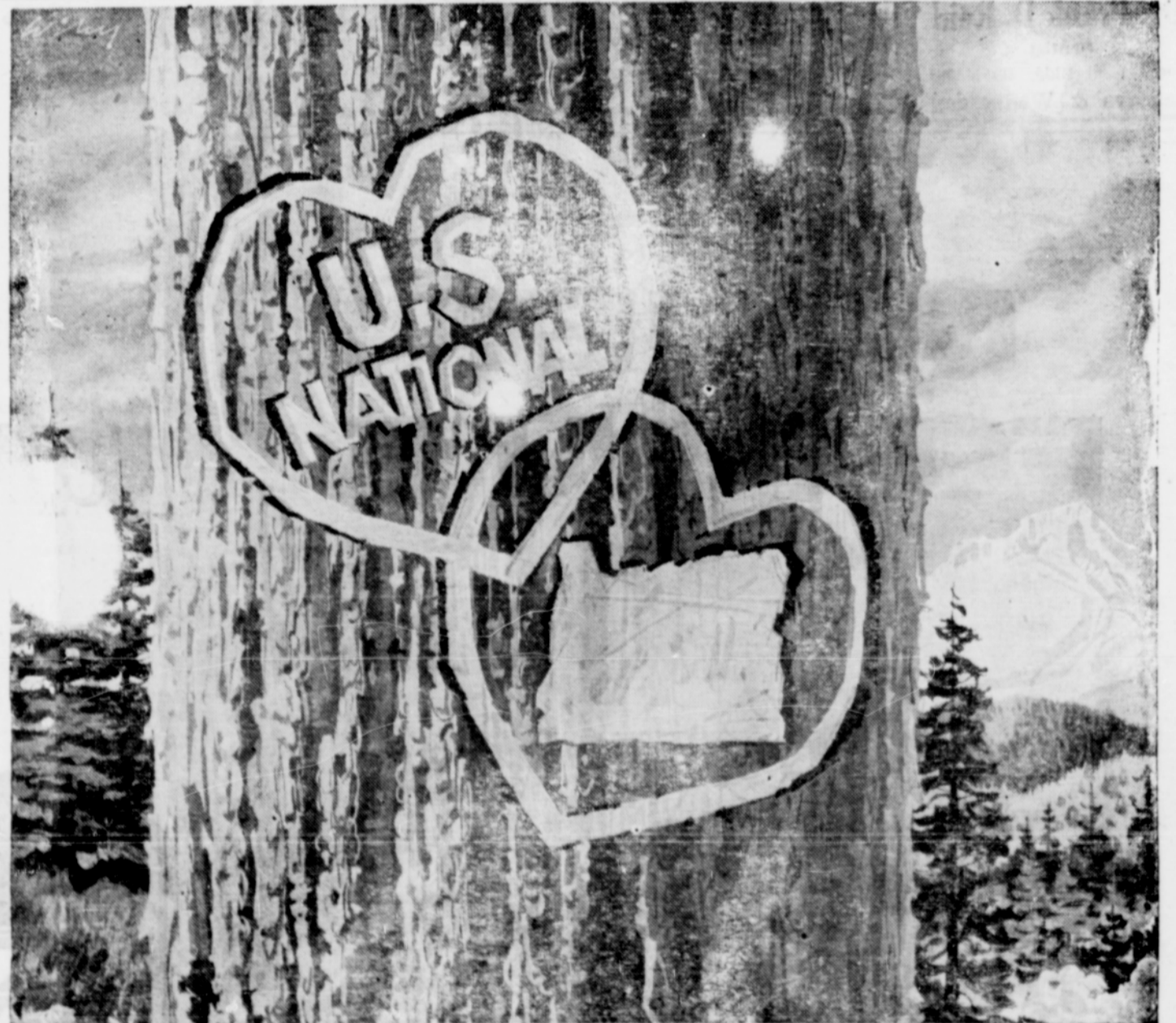
