Nature Not Helpful To Oregon Farmers

Mother Nature turned on Oregon farmers last year, lowering crop yields and causing farm income to slip a little.

After an excellent early season start, 1958 crops ran into high winds, untimely hot spells, grain diseases, shriveling, black stem rust, and one of the longest dry summers on record. As a result, income from crops lagged behind the year before, reports Mrs. Elvera Horrell, extension agricultural economist at OSC.

Reports from the US department of agriculture estimate Oregon farmer's cash income at \$391 million in 1958, down \$6 million from the year before. Most of this drop came from lower incomes from crops, she explained, as receipts from sales of livestock and livestock products in Oregon showed little change.

Total net income per farm last year, after adjustment for inventory changes, also showed little change, averaging \$2,680 compared to \$2,684 the year before. On

a realized net basis, however, before inventory adjustments, Oregon's income per farm from farming amounted to only \$2,477, Mrs. Horrell said—down 7% from 1957 and the lowest since 1954.

On a national basis cash receipts from farm sales gained 12% in 1958 to reach a new record high. Most states shared in this gain with largest upturns in mid-west states which had been plagued by drought in 1957.

With farm population declining and farm income increasing, the average income of farmers over the nation improved a bit. But there is still a wide gap between the income of farm and city people, Mrs. Horrell said.

Last year 12 percent of the nation's people lived on farms, but these 12% received less than 7% of the national income. On a per-person basis the income of farm people in 1958 averaged \$1,068—an increase of \$101 per person over 1957 and a record high. About a third of this amount came from non-farm sources. But this \$1,068 was still considerably below the income of \$2,034 averaged by non-farm people.
