### Tree Distribution Period Ending

The date for the end of distribution of trees for farm breaks is April 15, according to Tommy Thompson, in charge of distribution of trees here under the state forestry department.

For eastern Oregon ponderosa pine is recommended for an evergreen and black locust, caragana, Russian olive and Chinese elm are useful trees that vary in size so as to make a suitable wind break.

These can be ordered through Mr. Thompson at a cost of from \$10 to \$12 per thousand with a minimum of 50 of any one variety and \$1. Trees can be planted for the next two months in this area and if cared for a large percentage will live.

#### WANTS TWO PRICE PLAN

Senator Richard L. Neuberger of Oregon today told the Senate Agriculture committee "the hour is at hand for drastic overhauling" of the government's wheat program and urged adoption of a two-price plan designed to reduce surpluses.

Neuberger testified in favor of S. 1140, the Wheat Stabilization Act of 1959 under which wheat farmers would receive full parity price for the portion of production used for domestic food consumption with the balance priced for export and feed uses at lower levels. The plan is favored by the Oregon Wheat Growers League and other organizations representing wheat farmers.

#### OLD PICTURE HUNTED

The Old Sunnybrook Distillery, which is using a series of Frederic Remington's paintings, will pay a reward of \$25,000 for an old painting of a U. S. Cavalry charge painted between 1880 and 1909.

During the Centennial when Oregonians are rummaging around in attics some one may find this old picture which is about 10 x 6 feet and if so it should be photographed and the print sent to Old Sunnybrook Art Jury, Room 1100, 99 Park Ave., New York.

### Better Chemical For Weeds Expected

Wheat farmers can eventually look forward to a "one-shot" chemical to control both annual grasses such as cheat and broadleaf weeds in their growing wheat. Experimental work with promising chemicals is now in the third year of testing. Many additional points must be cleared up before this system is available and recommended—but, the prospects are brighter with one material—Simazine—presently on the market. One of the big hurdles is the approval by the Pure Food and Drug Administration in connection with the Miller Bill as to residue and tolerance allowed if sprayed on grain.

Time of application experimentally has been from fall seeding until late spring. The material is a wettable powder and acts as a sterilant in that rainfall must take the chemical into the soil. Good kills of both type weeds have resulted when application was made up to the boot stage of cheatgrass and a good rainfall followed. Low rates of 1 to 2 pounds per acre are being used. Currently the material is being sold for \$2.80 per pound with lower prices for larger purchases.

Experimental work is being carried out by Dean Swan at the Pendleton and Sherman Branch Experiment Stations. Demonstration trials exist in nearly all Columbia Basin counties. Demonstration trials have been established using cheatgrass control in wheat on four farms during the past few weeks—Bill Todd, Grass Valley; Hildred Zell and Pete Macnab, Wasco; and Vernon Miller, Moro. The work in progress may be the introduction of a revolutionary system of tillage and another addition made by scientific agriculture.

#### RED CROSS CAMPAIGN

The Red Cross campaign is in its last stage and due to end March 31. Nationally the campaign is doing well and local reports are not complete enough to judge since the last accounting showed the goal only a third of completion.

Contributions of less than 100 percent of quota would make it necessary to curtail some of the activities: home nursing, first aid, bloodmobile and water safety instruction—swimming.
