Oregon In History

March 28, 1851—

The first edition of the territory's newest newspaper, the Oregon Statesman was published at Oregon City. The editor is Mr. Asahel Bush, late of Massachusetts. Mr. Bush announces as a strictly Democratic partisan and promises to support that party firmly and unflinchingly. In a report to criticism voiced by editor Dryer of the Oregonian relative to Bush's choice as territorial printer Mr. Bush predicted the early demise of the Oregonian from lack of circulation and other causes.

March 28, 1878—The Portland superintendent of Western Union has set up a genuine telephone in his office and today demonstrated the device before a number of gentlemen and several members of the press. A second instrument was placed in the drug store of Dr. O.P.S. Plummer, at the corner of First and Salmon, about half a mile away, and the two were connected by insulated

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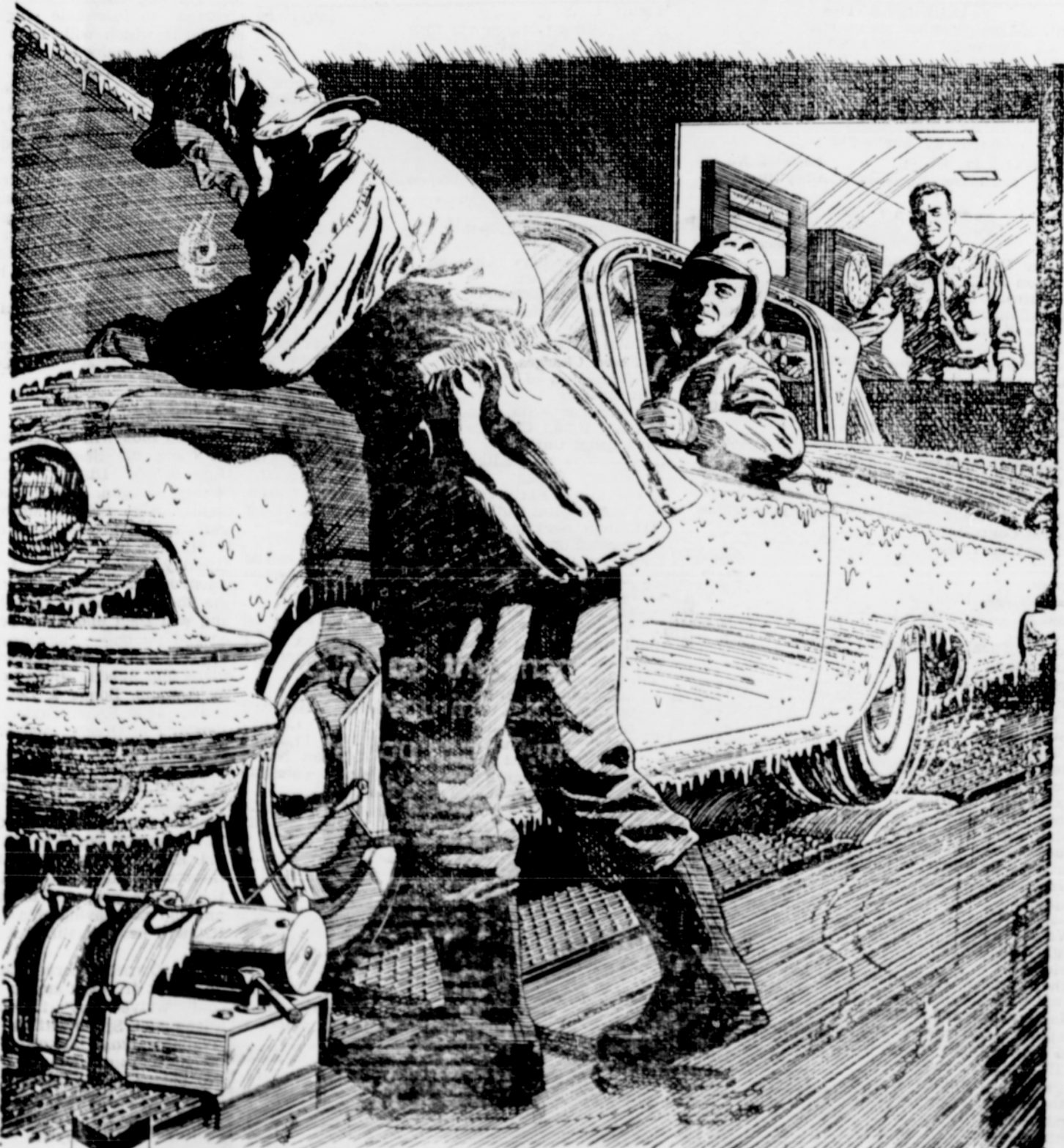
