County Ramblings

Will Oregon be ready if some devastating livestock disease, such as foot and mouth or rinderpest, hits within our boundaries?

A carefully mapped out program to meet such an emergency has been in existence for several years. Those who will play leading roles in swift action have been keyed in.

This is revealed neither to excite nor to lull into a sense of security states state veterinarians. Today no sign exists that such an emergency approaches. What tomorrow may bring, no one knows. But officials recognize that catastrophe could strike naturally—or be artificially induced.

Chart Tells Story

Veterinary officials of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in Washington, D. C. and in Oregon and the Oregon Department of Agriculture have planned the emergency steps to be taken if they become necessary. The federal government is a party because of interstate implications.

Veterinarians In Charge

Brunt of the operations program would be borne by the federal and state veterinarians in Salem, Dr. A. B. Beagle and Dr. L. E. Bodenweiser, respectively.

Measures involving national policy would be directed by the chief of the USDA's Animal Research Service, his emergency operations advisory staff and his area director.

In Oregon, the plan has been developed on two levels, state and area, with the federal and state veterinarians in Salem as overall directors.

Key personnel of the animal and administration divisions of the Oregon Department of Agriculture have been assigned specific roles.

The state highway engineer (vehicles) and the National Guard would also play a vital part in case of necessity.

Dr. Beagle and his assistant, Dr. O. J. Halverson, have attended federal schools to receive special training in diagnosis and detection of conditions which show any semblance to foot and mouth disease and rinderpest. As they go about their work in Oregon, they carry field sets equipped for this test work. Similar federal diagnostic personnel are assigned to each state.

Ontario, Baker, North Bend and Portland have been designated as area headquarters for field operations, with a federal veterinarian in charge at each point. Field work would be aided by county extension agents, BLM personnel and several private industries, the latter as sources of heavy duty equipment.

So much for the plan . . . may it never be used!

Why Fruit Trees Fail To Bear

A fruit tree normally begins to bear fruit after it becomes old enough to blossom freely, provided other conditions are favorable. Tree health and environment, bearing habits and the cultural practices used can all directly influence its ability to produce fruit. Adequate pollination is all essential to fruit production.

If any of these conditions are not favorable, yields may be reduced, or the tree may not bear at all. A grower can, however, exercise some control over most of them.

Periodically the Oregon State college, extension service, compiles a list of purebred livestock

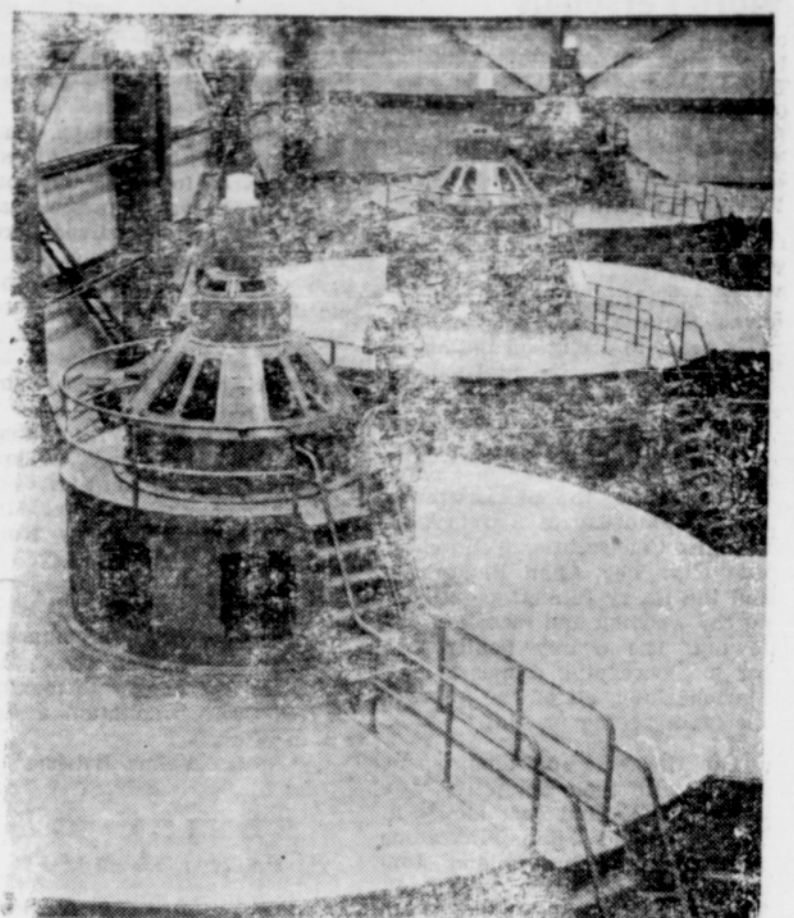

breeders in each county of the state. The list is made available to assist prospective buyers of a certain type stock in locating breeders. This list includes registered purebred livestock producers of sheep, cattle, swine, goat and this coming year horses.

Anyone that would like to make sure their name is included should contact the Sherman county extension office. This list needs to be completed and returned by April 1, so anyone interested should let us know immediately.

Occasionally certain fruit trees, particularly apples, bear heavily one year and largely fail to bloom the following year. This condition is called biennial bearing. Since the buds of most hardy fruits that open in the spring are formed during the previous summer, a very heavy crop may prevent bud formation.

Biennial bearing is difficult to change or correct. However, a return to normal yearly fruit production may be induced by early and heavy thinning (picking off) of the fruit during the year when the trees are producing a large yield. Only about one fruit per foot along the branches should be left after thinning to correct a biennial bearing condition, and the thinning should be done within 30 days after blooming.

Prune trees lightly up to bearing age. Heavy pruning retards the beginning of fruit bearing. Prune primarily by thinning out branches instead of heading back (reducing the height of the trees).

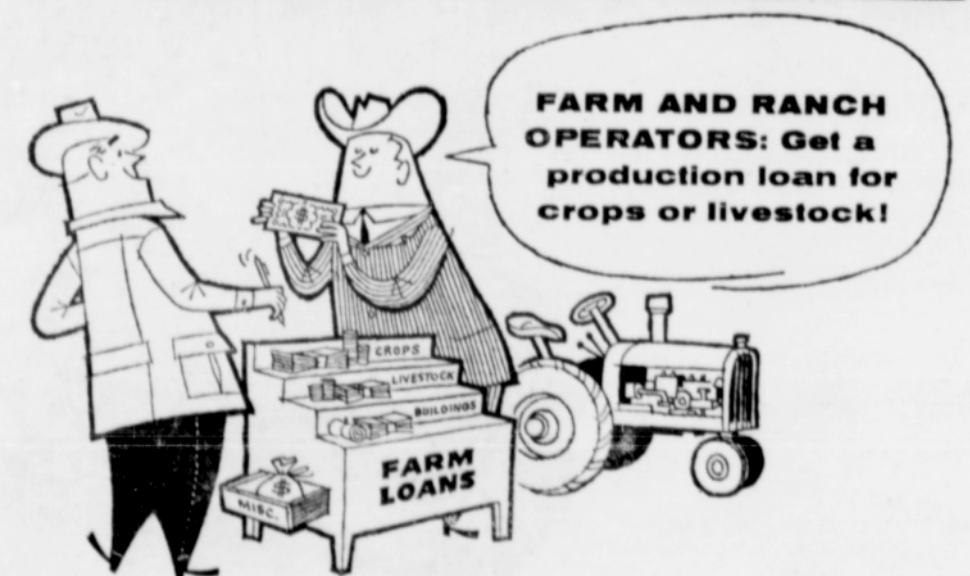
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
