ORGANIZATION
Americans are great for organization. Maybe the statement should be broader than that for all Anglo-Saxons seem to be adept at organizing. Back in the middle ages the guild system was made by a process of organization that eventually fell apart because it had become absurd.

It seems entirely possible that the organization phobia we now are undergoing will also become absurd; in fact, it is already. Business organized itself, men into companies, companies into corporations, corporations into holding companies, etc. etc., until a few rich men can control a vast economic empire in which their interest can be nothing else but financial.

Then the professions organized. The professions, of course, could not let it be even whispered that they were interested in the economics of organization; there had to be a less mundane reason. It was the public interest. No one can practice medicine, pull teeth, advise clients, sell insurance, peddle real estate or do any of a dozen things unless he conforms to certain standards established by the rulers of the profession.

Very naturally labor was not long to be outdone in this organizing world. Labor went for the economic benefits at first although recently it has begun to prate about the necessity of having some kinds of work done by a union man, plumbing, for instance. Now a man hired as a laborer can pick up things and move them but he cannot touch a hammer or a saw. An editor cannot touch a line of type; that takes a printer. A mechanic cannot sweep up his own shavings; that's for the janitor.

It is getting pretty foolish. We think nothing will be done to cure it and any cure proposed would have to withstand the opposition of all those organized who would defend the necessity and economy of their organizations to the end. Probably it is better not to try to change it; let it go—help it go on—until it falls of its own idioecy.

Then, maybe, we can build a civilization based on individual ability instead of the gangster methods that accompany over-organization.

POWER BILL
We cannot imagine any responsible legislature passing the power bill that was returned to committee this week. A similar proposal failed to get enough signatures last year to put it on the ballot which in itself signifies a lack of interest in putting Oregon in the power business.

Reason given for the bill is that Oregon is getting a smaller share of electric power from Columbia River dams than is Washington. This is because of the preference clause which gives public power bodies first choice on power developed by the federal government. The solution to this situation is repeal of the preference clause. It is not fair, nor proper, for the federal government to classify citizens as to their purchase of power. If our congressional delegation was not so prejudiced in favor of public power it would be working toward repeal of this clause.

Oregon has good private power. It is getting cheaper at a time when everything else is getting higher. The recent report of the Portland General Electric shows that the average revenue per kw has dropped from 1.29 cents in 1949 to 1.13 cents in 1958. Oregon power pays taxes in addition to furnishing power. It is well managed and well regulated, two features that cannot be said for federal power, which is managed for political reasons and not regulated except from Washington, D. C.

Oregon as a state and many Oregon communities have had a chance to vote on public power and it has not become popular. The state's voters have generally refused to become socialistic. Yet the Democrats insist on making it a political issue. We doubt that that is good politics and we are certain that it is not good economics.
