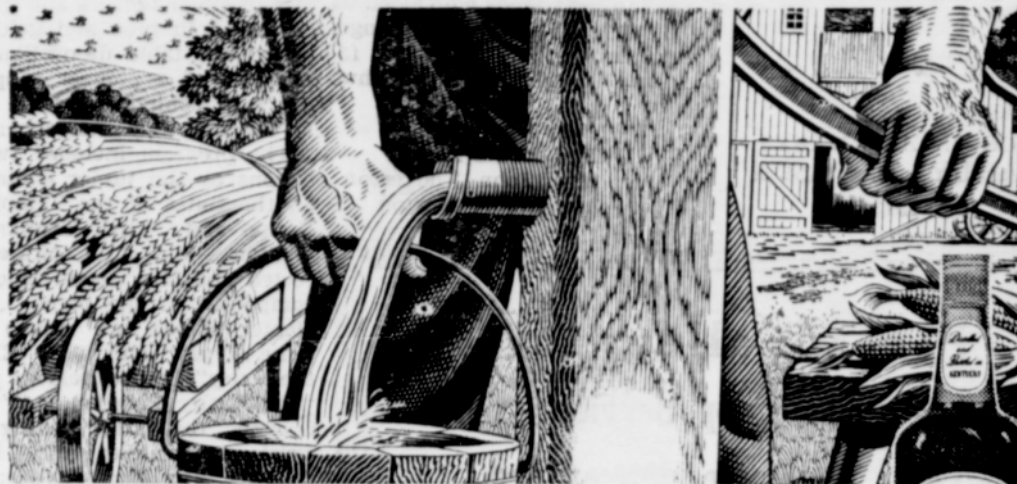

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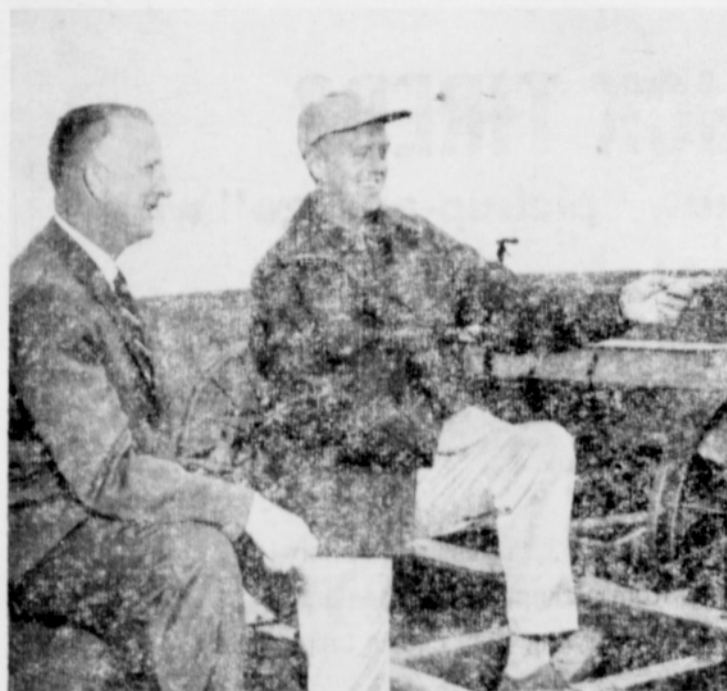
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TELEPHONE HELPS RUN RANCH BY REMOTE CONTROL

Running one 4,000-acre wheat ranch is usually work enough for any man. But Charles Tom (above, right, shown with me) operates two of them. One is at Rufus, Oregon, near his home in The Dalles, and the other 100 miles away near Heppner.

"Only the telephone could make my 'remote control' management possible," says Mr. Tom. "I seldom drive to my Heppner ranch. Why spend all day on the road when I can keep in touch by phone for just a few cents?"

Mr. Tom also uses his phone to keep on top of market conditions, and often sells his crops by phone, as well. One day last fall, he sold every bushel he had on hand by telephone. "Caught the market at the top, too," he said, "because the phone let me move fast."

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
