Guy Pound Wins Big Scholarship

Dr. Guy A. Pound, associate professor of metallurgical engineering at Carnegie Institute of Technology, was awarded the Guggenheim Fellowship, together with a Fulbright grant, which will enable Dr. Pound to carry out advance research on metallurgical subjects at the University of Sheffield, England.

The Guggenheim Fellowships are granted to persons of the highest capacity for scholarly research and to persons of unusual and proven creative ability in fine arts. The fellowships are designed to assist the recipients to advance themselves to higher levels of accomplishment in their fields through carrying on the studies for which the fellowships are awarded.

Dr. Pound received his B. A. in chemistry from Reed college in 1941. In 1943 his M. S. from Mass. Institute of Technology and his Ph. D. in chemistry from Columbia University in 1949. He has been a member of the metallurgical engineering department at Carnegie Tech since Sept. 1949. He will leave for England August 15 for one year.

Dr. Pound is a son of Mrs. Besse Pound of The Dalles and a graduate of The Dalles High School.

It has been nice here in Rufus the past week despite the threatening clouds hanging heavy in the heavens.

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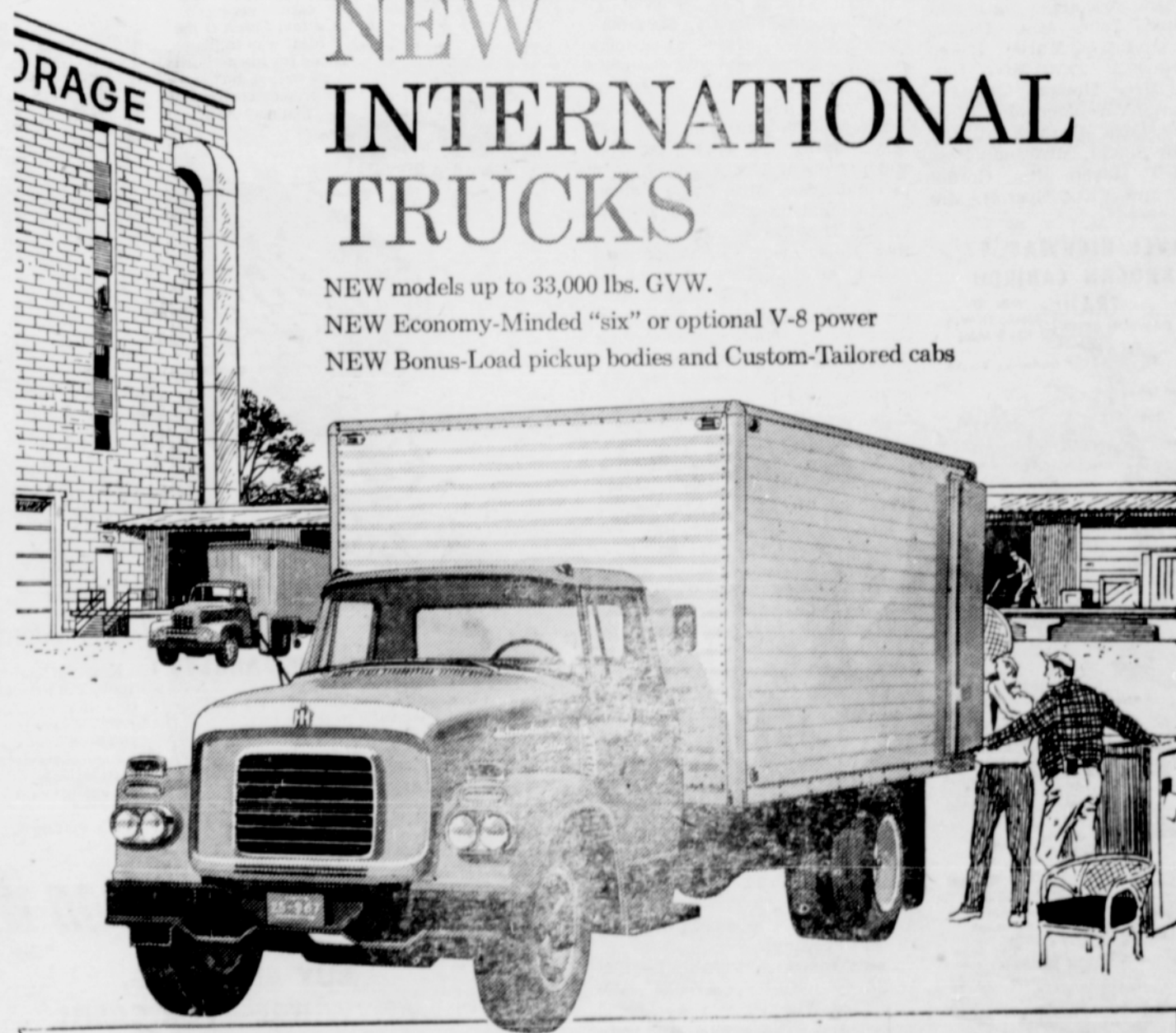
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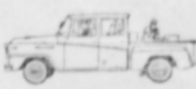
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
