

Woman's Clubs Start Costume Contest

The National contest sponsored for the second consecutive year by the General Federation of Women's Clubs, Washington, D. C. with the cooperation of Vogue Pattern Service and the Woman's Club Service Bureau, New York City, has been one of the activities of the Oregon Federation of this year with Mrs. Carl Tuggle of Wasco as Oregon chairman.

This contest was designed to select the "Ideal Costume for the Clubwoman's Wardrobe." Selection of the winning outfit was on the basis of versatility and appropriateness for club occasions, over all fashion effect, becomingness to wearer and workmanliness.

Local contestants were judged first at special meetings of the clubs with these winners entering District competition throughout the state during the month of April, each District winner being awarded a one-year subscription to Vogue Pattern book. The Oregon contest closed with the selection of the state winner this week at a tea with Mrs. Carl Tuggle and Mrs. Robert Bish of Wasco acting as hostesses, in Nona's Studio of Sewing and Design in Oswego where four Districts sent winners. Mrs. Robert Billingsley of Medford represented the First District; Mrs. M. O. Littrell, Coos Bay, Second District; Mrs. Elza Weed, St. Helens, Third District and Mrs. John Craig of The Dalles the Fourth District.

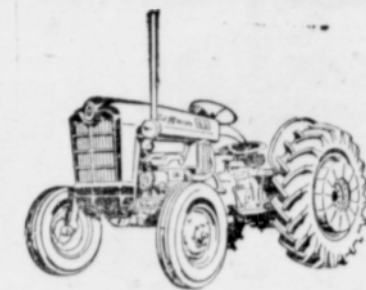
