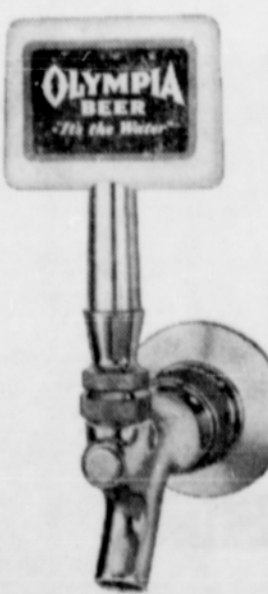

Oregon In History

May 12, 1911—The famous Wolvenine transcontinental autocar arrived in Portland today, the sixth day after departing from San Francisco. It left Salem this morning and took only two hours and a half to Oregon City and an hour more to Portland. The little motorcar left Detroit last Dec. 12 for New York and from that city returned to Detroit and continued on across the continent.

May 15, 1858—Additional and reliable news has been received from the newly discovered gold mines on Fraser's River. This news is highly favorable to the establishment of the fact that gold exists there in paying quantities. Miners are constantly leaving for these northern mines via The Dalles. A meeting has recently been held in Vancouver, B. C. to consider plans for laying out a pack trail from that place to the mines.

May 14, 1844—Oregon this day held its first general election to choose the officers of the Oregon Provisional government. Osborne Russell, William J. Bailey and

Peter G. Stewart were elected to the executive committee. Dr. I. A. Babcock was chosen as supreme court judge and Joseph Meek as Sheriff. Eight members were elected to the legislature.
