Bob Arnold, who is to write the report on the economy and social status of Sherman county for the planning commission, was here last week gathering data for his report.

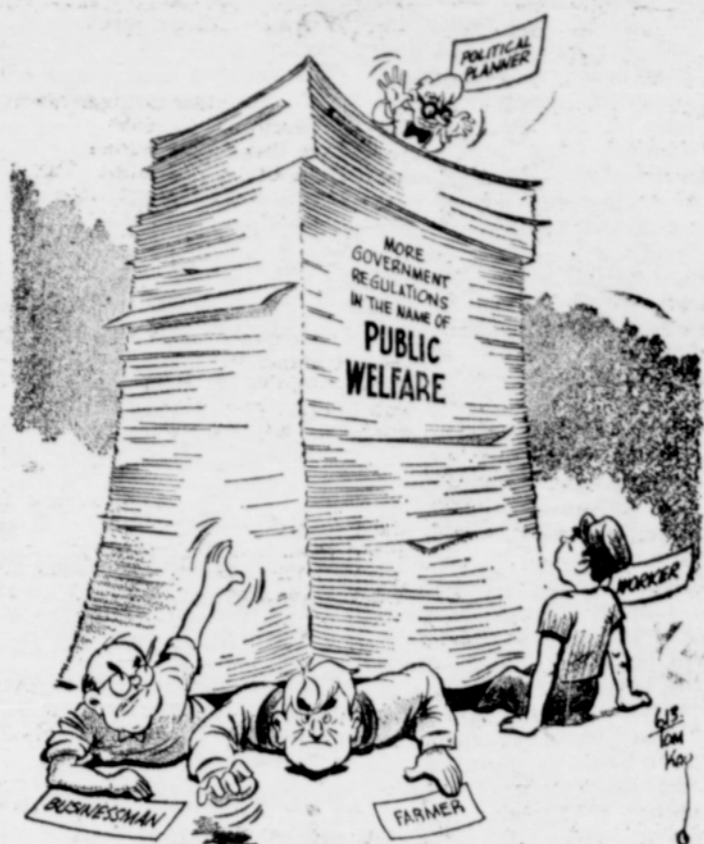
