County Agricultural Agents

Excellent louse control has been obtained with the Co-Ral spray. Observations have not indicated a substantial degree of louse control with bolus treatment. Trails under Oregon conditions attempting to determine the effect of grub control on weight gains have been inconclusive. Reports from trials in other states are variable, but in general, indicate slight evidence of weight gains in favor of treated animals when on full feed or fattening rations. A definite advantage does occur from feed lots to slaughter during periods when grubs would be in their backs.

Recommendations are: Co-Ral—a 0.5 per cent spray solution by adding 16 pounds of 25 per cent wettable powder to 100 gallons of water. About 1 gallon of spray per head is needed. Trolene—earlier this material was known as ET-57. The trade name Trolene has been used, but is now being changed to Ronnel. One bolus (15 grams active ingredient) is administered orally with a balling gun for each 300 pounds of body weight.

Neither Co-Ral nor the Trolene bolus is recommended for lactating dairy animals and to avoid residues in milk should not be applied to dairy animals that will freshen within a 60-day period of treatment. Rotenone is the only material recommended for grub control on lactating dairy animals.

Systemic grub treatment is not recommended, or usually needed, for young animals under six months of age. Do not treat sick animals or animals under stress. Cattle should have free access to feed and water before and after treatment. To avoid residues in meat do not treat within 60 days of slaughter.

In none of our trials has treatment resulted in a loss of animals. In a few instances side effects such as bloating, salivation, stiffness and dragging of hind quarters were observed. These symptoms were transitory and disappeared from 48 to 72 hours after treatment with no apparent ill

effects. Reports indicate that such symptoms are most likely to be displayed by animals treated late in the season, after November 1.

Proper Spraying Methods

Spray pressures above 250 pounds per square inch (p.s.i.) usually are classed as "high pressure" and are obtained by using a piston-type pump. Piston-type pumps will develop pressures above 250 pounds and are commonly used at or above 400 pounds for livestock sprays. These pumps are usually capable of delivering more than 4 gallons per minute at the above pressures enabling an operator to treat an animal with a gallon of spray in less than 15 seconds. This is possible where large herds are to be treated.

With high pressure it is possible to stand as far as 8 feet from an animal with short hair and obtain thorough wetting to the skin. As the hair coat becomes longer and thicker in the fall and winter, it is necessary to bring the nozzle closer to the animal to obtain comparable wetting through the hair.

Many farm sprayers used for spraying weeds or crops are equipped with nylon roller pump. This pump will deliver up to 200 p.s.i. and is quite suitable for use on animals in short hair.

They have a working distance of three to four feet from nozzle to animal, but this distance must be reduced and the nozzle brought as

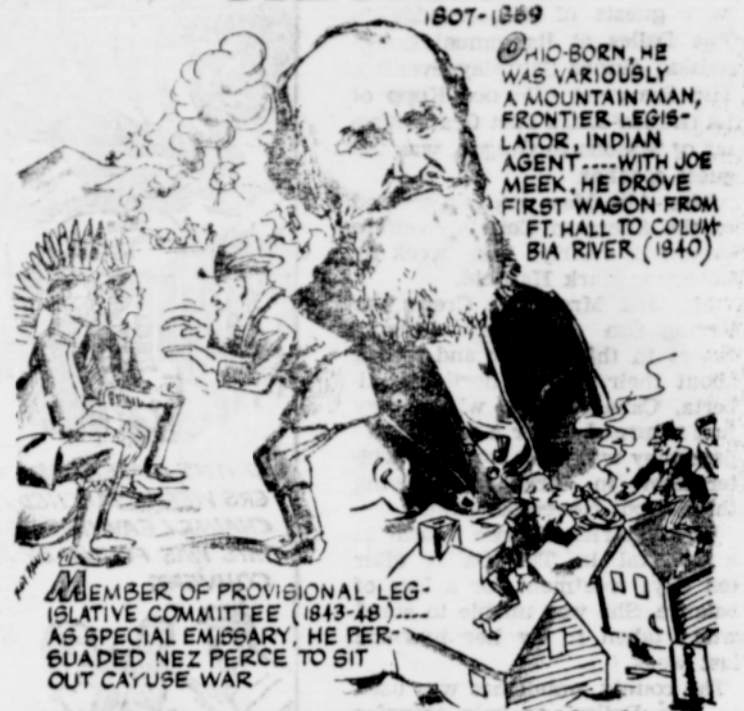
close as six inches from the animal as the hair coat becomes thick in the fall. The Co-Ral formulation has been made with carriers which have low abrasive character, and is therefore not injurious to the pump.

Many sprayers do not have mechanical agitators. If such a sprayer is to be used, a circulating bypass should be provided with the opening of the bypass hose return at the bottom of the tank to assure agitation. Thorough agitation is important to maintain uniform dosage.

The use of a knapsack sprayer developing 20 to 40 pounds pressure per square inch is not recommended for the application of Co-Ral unless the animal has a short, clean coat. If a knapsack sprayer is used, it is helpful to first curry the animal. The nozzle should be held within two or three inches of the hair and should be adjusted to deliver coarse droplets rather than a fine mist.

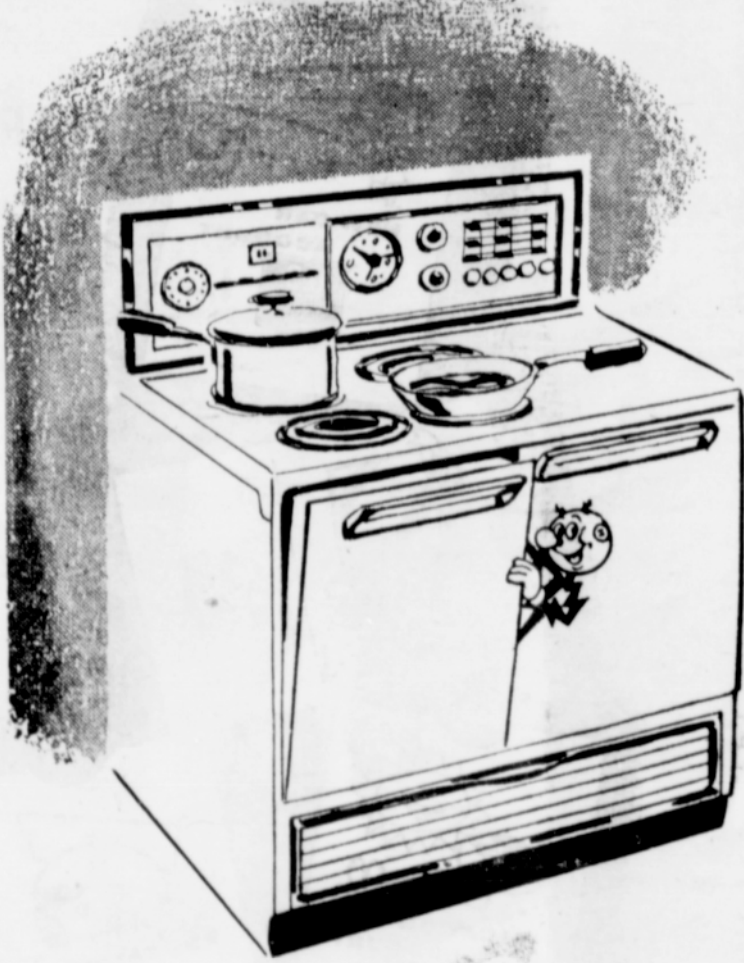

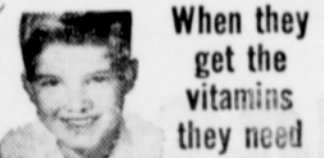
