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October Seemed Warmer Than It Was To Thermometer

October was a month that obtained many fine remarks from the citizens of this county because it was so warm and comfortable, the days so sunny and bright. It is very nice and very uncommon for citizens to be happy about weather but according to the record October was little better than usual, the mean temperature being but .01 degrees warmer than normal.

The mean was 50.9. The first frost occurred October 10, five days later than normal but because spring frosts were seven days later than normal the frost free period was only 147 days, two days short of average.

It rained .77 inch in October and that is .38 inch short. The crop year precipitation is now 1.60, short .04. Average wind was 3.3 miles per hour, slightly less than normal.

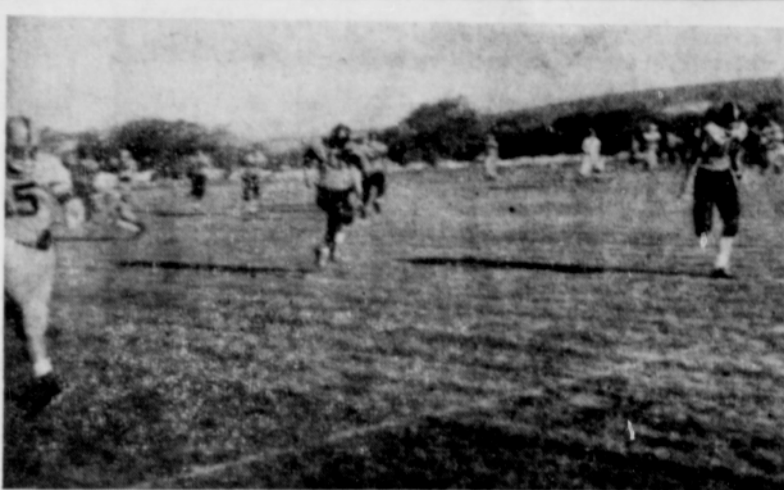

CHRISTMAS FUNDS OUT

Thousands of thrift-minded Oregonians are receiving a total of more than one million dollars this week for holiday shopping as the United States National Bank of Portland sends out checks to Christmas saving club members.

The colorful checks are being mailed from U. S. National's 72 banking offices in Oregon to members who joined the bank's 1959 Christmas savings club, according to President E. C. Sammons.

The mailman will play Santa Claus for 26,500 Oregon residents this week when he delivers Christmas Club checks valued at \$2,250,000 from the First National Bank of Oregon, according to local branch manager R. E. Ferrell.

Goldendale Half Beats Sherman With Two Runs

Intersagan, a Goldendale back, got outside Sherman ends twice in last Friday's game on the local field and both times made enough yardage to insure a touchdown. Outside of Intersagan the Sherman boys contained the bigger lads across the river in fine style.

The first score came early in the game. Sherman kicked off and Intersagan brought the ball back to his 37 yard line. Goldendale could not move the ball and kicked. Sherman couldn't make yardage either and Kaseberg sent one of his high long kicks to Intersagan on the 30 and that speedy little Washingtonian ran it back for the first touchdown for the visitors.

Sherman scored in the second quarter. After Duncan had lost big yardage because the Goldendale line came through on him the visitors were penalized 15 yards for holding and with fourth down and eight to go Duncan passed down the center to Kaseberg on the 15 yard line and he went over unmolested. Goldendale blocked Zachary's kick and it was 7-6.

Intersagan Again

Later in the same quarter Kaseberg punted to the Goldendale 25 and on the next play Intersagan ran outside his right end to the Sherman 10 only to be caught by John Fields. Another pass to Intersagan completed the drive but the kick was no good. Score 13-6.

In the third quarter Duncan passed to Blaylock on the Goldendale 40 for a good gain and on fourth down with two to go Kaseberg ran to the 17. On the next play another Duncan-Blaylock pass resulted in a score, but Sherman was offside on the kick play and Kaseberg's try was not good on the longer distance. The score remained 13-12 although Sherman had another scoring chance near the end of the game when Kaseberg ran to the Goldendale six after receiving a pass from Duncan but could go no farther and the visitors took the ball at game's end.

Friday Sherman plays the league championship game with Maupin in the field at Moro to decide which team meets St. Mary's of Medford in the first game of the playoffs.
