**Power Company Pays 1959 Tax Bill**

Pacific Power & Light Company's tax payment this week to Sherman County Sheriff George J. Geiser Jr., for levies on company property in the county will total \$7,818.98, according to Ray Kelso, local PP&L agent.

Largest share of the PP&L tax check, to be delivered by Friday, will be apportioned among school taxing districts, Kelso reported.

Pacific Power will pay a total of \$2,626,015.42 in property taxes to 28 Oregon counties this year, reflecting the company's large investments in new electric facilities to bring power to customers in PP&L service districts.

**Union Pacific Gives County \$37,750**

Union Pacific Railroad will pay \$37,751 in Sherman county property taxes Friday, November 13 in a check to Sheriff George J. Geiser Jr.

The railroad will also pay \$85,722 in taxes in Wasco county and \$56,133 in Gilliam county.

Union Pacific said its 1959-60 real property taxes in Oregon total \$1,362,663. The railroad said it also paid approximately \$339,000 in miscellaneous state taxes.
