ther, Mrs. T. M. Rolfe and Mrs. E. E. Barron of Moro, to The Dalles Friday to see their eye and ear doctors.

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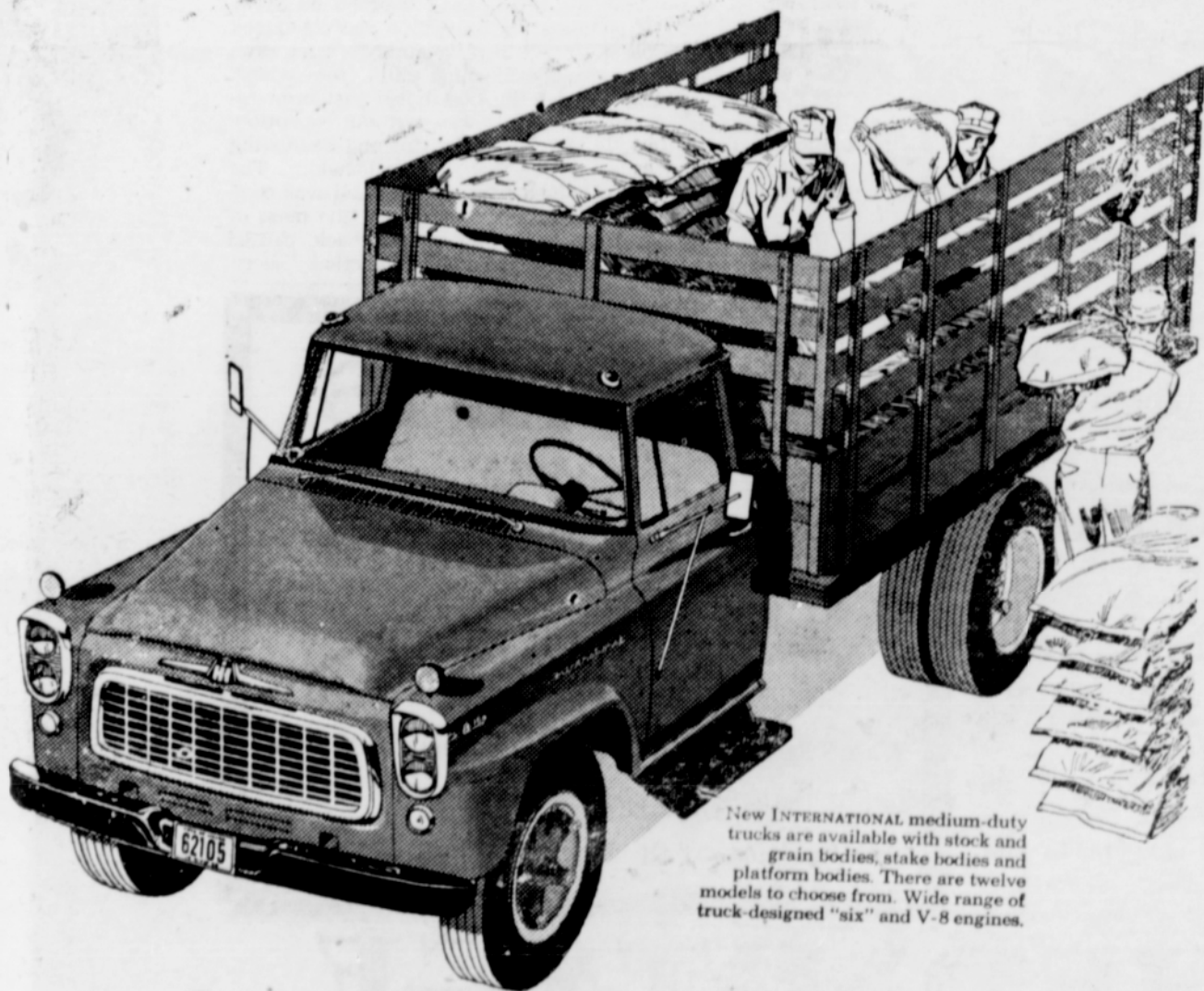
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
