County Ramblings

Odds and Ends
 Livestock transportation books, farm record books, farm building and equipments plans are available at the office of your extension agent at nominal cost. Many other items are available to serve the agricultural industry—soil testing for farm and garden; hay and feed analysis; insect, disease and weed identification; livestock disease diagnosis; and many others.

Tree and Shrub Orders
 Order blanks are available for farmers who want to order seedling trees for farm windbreak, shelter belts, or game habitat protection. The State Board of Forestry each year makes several types of adaptable trees and shrubs available for farm and forest plantings. Various evergreens,

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broadleaf trees and shrubs are available for Eastern Oregon. To be sure of getting the type seedlings you desire orders should be placed now. Shipment of trees to Eastern Oregon is not done until early spring. Call, write, or stop by for your order blank today.

Winter Brush Spraying
 You can spray undesired brush during the winter period. The only change from summer spraying is the method of application and the carrier for the spray.

When leaves are on the brush, use water as the carrier for the active spray material.

When leaves are off the brush, and for certain brush species, oil is substituted for water, and the spray is applied principally to the stems and trunks of the plant. This is commonly called basal spraying. The usual mixture for basal spraying is 20 to 25 gallons of oil, plus 4 lbs., usually one gallon, of ester of 2,4-D or 2, 4,5-T or a mixture of the two.

The advantages of basal spraying are (1) longer spray season for brush control, (2) brush can be sprayed when susceptible crops are dormant, or not planted, (3) lower pressure sprayers can be used.

Basal spray the lower 2 to 3 ft. brush of the tree. Enough spray should be used to reach the ground line at the base of the plant.

Cut stump spraying is another common spray method. This method is generally used for larger trees, trees larger than 8 to 10 inches, after cutting. It is important that cut stumps be sprayed immediately after cutting, before the cut surface has dried out. This will prevent sucker growth from the cut trees. Painting stumps with a mixture of 2,4-D and crank case oil is also successful.

Home Garden Spraying
 The first spray for control of peach leaf curl should be applied by December 15. Apply a second spray before the buds swell in the spring. This spray should be applied during the last two weeks in January.

The fungus spores which cause peach curl are now on the young peach twigs, bark, and bud scales. These very small spores will germinate in late December if weather conditions are favorable, or in the spring and infect the peach buds.

Because the fungus spores are so small and the peach buds are often partially protected by the limbs and twigs, it takes time and lots of spray to cover the buds thoroughly. Don't try to rush the job, it doesn't pay.
 Spray materials to use are:

Lime sulphur: 1-2 3 cups per 1 gallon of water, or Puritized Agricultural Spray: 1 tbl. per gallon of water, or TAG: 1-2 tbl. per 1 gallon of water.
CAUTION: Lime sulfur may discolor painted surfaces, so protect by painting building by cardboard or polyethylene sheets. Puritized spray and TAG contain mercury and are poisonous if swallowed. Store the containers away from children and pets; never store in used pop bottles, etc. Mercury-containing fungicides may cause a mild skin burn on some people.
