Bangs Regulations Revised Again

Revised regulations governing the brucellosis and tuberculosis testing program in Oregon were announced this week by the state department of agriculture. Revisions were hammered out in sessions of the official state brucellosis advisory committee and the voluntary brucellosis committee with department officials. They are geared to the modified certified status the state now holds.

One of the major changes relates to the handling of cattle held in herds quarantined for brucellosis. At present, some 220 herds are under quarantine of the 34,785 herds on department records.

Henceforth, to remove any animal from a quarantined herd, permission must first be obtained from the state department of agriculture, one of its assistant state veterinarians or from federal veterinarians in the field.

"Painful experience and expensive futile prosecutions under the old system with its numerous exceptions leads us to adopt the new and tighter program, which will apply to fewer and fewer herds as time goes on," says Dr. M. R. Woulfe, assistant state veterinarian.

Another important change prohibits the home slaughter of Bang's reactors. Such reactors must now be slaughtered at slaughter plants under either state, municipal or federal meat inspection. This means protection for consumers everywhere and eliminates the cost of sending state officials to farms to supervise the slaughter of reactors. It will also take the confusion out of indemnity payments. Owners will receive indemnity when animals are slaughtered at licensed plants.
