ECONOMICS

The president of the New York stock exchange told high school principals in convention assembled in Portland that schools should teach economics. That must have surprised some principals who think they do.

Since we are so rapidly evolving from an agricultural nation to an industrial one surely the teaching of economics should be as important as the teaching of agriculture. A far greater number of graduates are going to be involved in some form of industry than in agriculture.

Economics need not be a difficult subject and even if it were high school youngsters can handle difficult subjects if they are not of a nature to require too many years of educational background.

We wouldn't be surprised if some of the talks that have been given before the high school principals will change the curriculum in many schools. Courses could be modernized and requirements of both teacher and pupil raised so that schools can meet criticism of parents. Dr. Conant has written a long report on high schools that will certainly influence secondary schools and parents are beginning to take an interest in education as training of the mind (which it is) instead of athletics and the showier evidences of school training.

HAVES AND HAVE-NOTS

In typical American manner we are usually thinking of money or the manifestations thereof, when we refer to have and have-nots. Recently there is evidence that we are thinking of atomic weapons.

In any event there are many other things about which to be well off. Some people have children, some have not. Some have good looks, some have not. Some have good health, some have not. Some are strong, some are weak; some are fearful, some are brave; some are jittery, some are calm.

We like to remember what Richard Nixon said at the dedication of The Dalles dam. It was that we were inclined to compete with Russia about the wrong things, the material things, weapons, submarines, missiles. We should compete with Russia on freedom, individual opportunity, basic rights, said the vice-president.

We have a nation not because we have money and what it buys, but because we have the freedom to exercise our abilities, the right to accumulate (after taxes), and the right to save. Any one of them are more important than the having of money.

COLD MARCH

Sherman countians, accustomed to easy winters and sometimes violent springs in recent years, should not have been surprised at the cold wind that brought freezing temperatures last week. The four inch fall of snow Wednesday was something different. It seldom snows in March in sufficient quantity to stay on the ground. With six inches of frost in the ground this may stay on a long time.

What has happened to the barley no one knows but it is hard to find an optimist in discussing it. Some express hope for the winter barley but those who seeded spring barley last fall are resigned to doing it again come spring.

This has been a surprising winter and even a snowy January was not had and generally welcomed as a bit of seasonal weather that would insure spring when time came for that season. Now it is March, which we consider a spring month, and a cold east wind is bringing a dry and worthless snow to take us back to January.

By the calendar we are surely nearer spring: by the thermometer we are in the midst of winter and we know which indicator we are going to dress for.

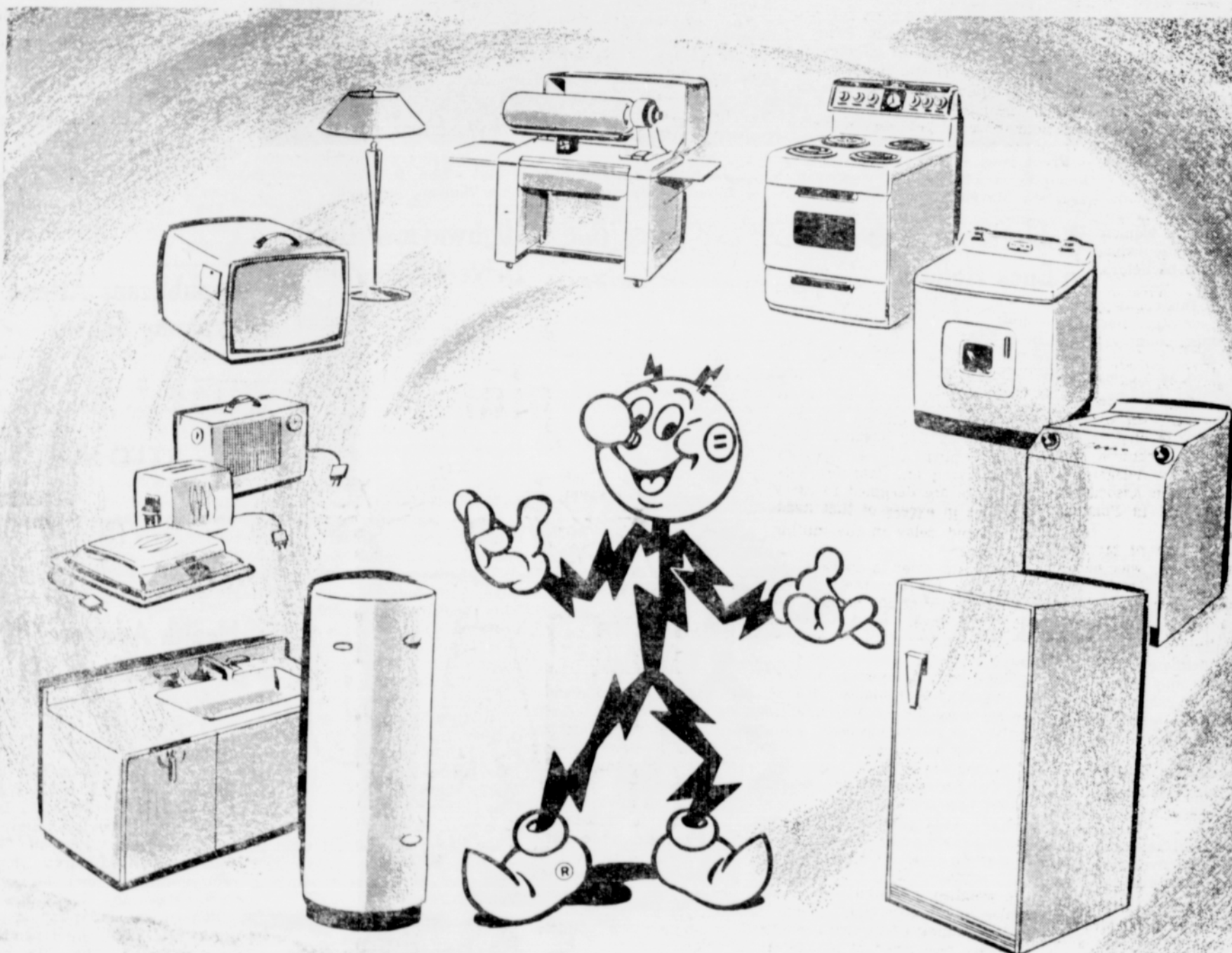
