IDEAS

Probably Jules Verne started it all with his fanciful stories about what seemed impossible things. Anyway by the turn of the century hundreds of boys were writing about going to the moon as a means of expanding their already lively imaginations.

Then Karl Marx, who was a poor German Jew trying to feed a family in a London slum, wrote his discontents with the aid of Engels who was a better writer. He found much wrong with society—almost as much as society found wrong with him.

As with Jules Verne, the problem is how to stop it when once started. That has not been settled.

SCHOOL COSTS

The five elementary schools in Sherman county expect to spend \$398,550 in the year beginning July 1, 1960. There are 411 pupils in those schools so the cost is going to be very close to \$1000 per school child.

Of that sum 45 percent or \$179,375 is expected to be spent for instruction. Of course, it is necessary to have a place to teach and heat and other essentials and not all the money could possibly go for actual teaching.

Elementary schools can be expected to do a better job of using the money for teaching than secondary schools. They have limited athletics programs and do not give so many courses that are training instead of education.

The point is that the cost of education is much less than the cost of schools. It may be necessary to spend money to try to interest those whose bent is toward athletics and the physical skills as long as we have laws to make children go to school.

BRIBERY Senator Proxmire wants to make it illegal for any public official to accept anything of value, not a meal, a drink or a cigar. It would also be illegal for anyone to offer any official anything.

The senator is being very material. He assumes that bribery is conducted in dollars or material gifts or that an officer might be influenced by accepting a cigar or a meal. Neither has the senator much respect for human integrity.

No politician is so crass as to be bribed with money. He will, however, listen to promises of support at next election, plans for a laudatory story of his work, a picture with the locally prominent. A kind word tempts a politician more than a cigar.

THERE'S NOTHING GOING ON Two or three times a year the little wheat towns become suddenly lifeless. The merchants visit and improve their time to straighten their stock. The streets are deserted. Because there is

nothing going on in town it is customary to so report. As a matter of fact these are the periods when the county is performing the functions that give it its place in the world. Some farmers are sowing barley and while barley is not a highly cherished crop among local wheat growers it makes good stock feed. Some farmers are plowing fields preparatory to planting wheat next fall. About the only activity in which this county was able to distinguish itself has been the growing of wheat. We are hard to beat at that, right up among the top notchers and while there is nothing going on in town the important work of the county is going on outside.

RACE RIOTS

The shooting of black men in Africa by white men seems very foolish. There are so many blacks, so few whites, so few they would be helpless without the labor of the blacks. It is not morals we are considering, but merely the practical aspects of it: a few whites cannot hold control of Africa against the blacks. As a minority they must compromise. Morally the whites have been preaching a doctrine completely opposed to such acts as machine gunning of crowds. From this great distance it looks as if the whites who cannot get along with the native Africans had better move back to Europe and let the blacks have that continent. Neither do we think the consequences of such a move would be serious for the world as a whole.

YOU GOTTA LOSE

The contest between southerners and "liberals" in the U. S. senate still goes on and we are sure that master of legislative finagling, Lyndon Johnson, has it well under his control. He knows, as does every experienced legislator or seasoned public official that there is a time to win and a time to lose.

The public gets very tired of a leader who always wins and may gang up against him. The wise leader is he who can arrange and time his losses so that he only loses the ones he can afford to lose. The matter of saving face is involved. If you let an opponent beat you today on some minor matter he may let you win tomorrow on something that is important.

It is only the amateur that tries to win them all. Experience teaches a leader how to win the big ones and the wisdom of losing now and then. Trying to win them all has made a has-been out of a lot of politicians.
