**CARE OF GAME TELLS MUCH ABOUT HUNTERS**

The care a sportsman gives fish between the stream and the dinner table can make a big difference in the way it tastes. The same is true for fowl and big game.

Proper handling is explained in a new Oregon State college extension service bulletin which details ways to clean and cook fish, fowl and big game.

The bulletin pictures how to pluck game birds, how to clean a trout, how to fillet a fish, how to skin a catfish, and how to skin a perch. A big game chart locates bones, diagrams meat cuts, and suggests how to use various cuts.

**LICENSE STICKERS SOMETIMES CONFUSE**

Improper placement of the 1961 auto license stickers still is causing some Oregon Motorists trouble.

The department of Motor Vehicles says the problem arises when people attempt to put the sticker on top of the old metal tab. The tab, the department reminds, should be removed before the new sticker is applied.

If the sticker is placed on top of the metal tab it will not adhere correctly and it may work free and become lost.

Car owners are urged to read instructions provided with the sticker before placing it on the license plate. When properly applied, the sticker cannot be stolen or lost. This gives it an advantage over the metal tabs which have been used in Oregon.
