Better Feed Is Hope

New feeds and feeding practices that show promise of helping Oregon cattlemen compete in today's selective meat markets will be spotlighted at the second annual beef cattle day May 18 at Oregon State college.

The program will open at 9 a. m. in Withycombe hall, according to Dr. J. C. Miller, head of the department of dairy and animal husbandry. During the day, OSC animal scientists will report on recent research projects on the value of various protein and mineral feed supplements, feeding performance of different forms of wafering and pelleting of feeds, and effects of varying levels of grain supplements during the fattening period.

Research results will come from the various OSC agricultural branch experiment stations over the state, as well as from research laboratories on campus, Miller said.

Out-of-state speakers will include Dr. A. J. Wood, professor of animal nutrition at the University of British Columbia and Bob Norrish, Armour's Livestock Bureau, Chicago. Wood will report his experiments using industrial by-products and low-grade feeds in Canadian beef-feeding trials. Norrish will outline the meat packer's interest in beef cattle improvements, and explain what his company is doing to improve beef breeding herds.

Talks by OSC staff members on the economic outlook for the beef industry during the coming year, beef disease problems, and range management practices will also be given during the day. A special panel at the end of the program will give those attending a chance to quiz any of the speakers on problems of special interest.

Main speaker at an evening buffet dinner—set for 7 a. m. in the OSC Memorial Union building—will be C. W. McMillan, vice-president of American National Cattlemen's Association, Denver. He will give his views on the way the cattle industry must move to be successful in the future. A special program is being planned for ladies attending the beef day.

COUNTY RAMLIN'S

The second annual beef cattle field day at OSC has been set for May 18. The program will open at 9:00 a. m. in Withycombe hall. Spring Grass Seeding

Establishing grass-legume stands in years past has been a real task coupled with uncertainty of securing a stand. During the past few years, experience by Sherman county ranchers has proven that seedings do not have to be made on summer fallow and the best seeding equipment is the deep furrow drill. Bill Todd, Grass Valley, has now tried out another method that has worked wonderfully well and provides an ideal seed bed for spring seeding. Once the stubble ground begins to dry off in the spring, Bill runs a sweep at as shallow a depth as possible—around 3 inches. He then applies nitrogen fertilizer and follows this 2 to 3 times over with a skew-treader or off-set rotary hoe. This operation levels off the ground, scatters the straw, kills the top growth, and leaves the ground in a firm condition ideal for grass seeding.

Once the seed bed has been prepared, he seeds with a deep furrow drill. Last spring an excellent stand of grass-alfalfa was obtained by this method. Last week additional grass was seeded on this ranch.

The seeding mixture consisted of five pounds per acre of Siberian Wheatgrass and one pound of preinoculated Ladak alfalfa. This is the first use of Siberian Wheatgrass in a field planting in the county. This grass has looked good in grass nurseries in the area. The preinoculated alfalfa is new this year and should be of real help to local ranchers planting alfalfa. Additional varieties will be available next year handled in this manner.

Other grass seedings are being made around the county this year. Conservation Reserve seedings have been made by George Wilson, Kent, and Kenneth Morehouse for Mrs. Hartung. Paulen Kaseberg, Wasco, is making a change-over in his grass rotation program—plowing up some grass-legume ground, in for five years, and seeding additional land. Around 250 acres of grass-alfalfa is being seeded on the Locust Grove ranch and the home ranch. Clyde Fridley is making a pasture seeding using Whitmar Beardless Wheatgrass and alfalfa. Others making pasture or hay seedings are Clifford Trumbo and Bob Rolfe.

Aphid Control on Shade Trees

Many people around the county have trouble during the late spring with honey dew droppings from their shade trees around their homes. This, by some, is thought to be a natural secretion from shade trees. The actual cause is created by aphids and can be controlled by application of an insecticide at the time the trees are leafing out. The best material for this purpose is Malathion. Application can be made by hand or orchard type spray nozzles. Concentration of material should be 2 tablespoons of 50% emulsion concentrate of malathion to one gallon of water; or one pint of 50 gallons of water. A repeat application in three weeks may be necessary in more concentrated infestations or where the weather is unusually damp.

Facts From Here and There

Cattle bruising during marketing and processing caused losses ranging from six cents to \$2.27 a head in a study by USDA's Farmers Cooperative Service. This adds up to a 12 million dollar a year loss.

The National Safety Council reports that since 1952, the fatality rate per 100,000 farm tractors has increased from 18 to over 27, while non-fatal accidents, involving the farm tractor, are estimated at 45,000 a year. The Council further points out that the total cost of all tractor accidents exceeds 100 million dollars a year. The equivalent productions of 1 out of every 8 acres of United States cropland goes abroad. America's increased population is expected to require 50 per cent more cattle by 1975.
