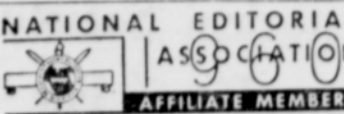

KIND OF GOVERNMENT

The example in Korea is a good one to show that people get the kind of government they want even though it may take a long time and entail the enlistment of a large group of the citizenry.

If they will put up with crooked government be assured some one will provide it—and make a nice profit out of it; if they will stand for wasteful and expensive governments and elect the careless and inefficient that is what they get; if they want a give-away government they can have that until the country goes broke and the inexorable rules of economics comes into play.

Recently two Oregon congressmen, Walter Norblad an experienced Republican from the first district and Al Ullman, a comparative newcomer and a Democrat from the second district, sent out questionnaires to constituents. They asked some questions about taxes and received some positive answers. "Do you favor an increase in federal income taxes if it would mean more funds for education and scientific research?" asked Ullman and 23 per cent said Yes and 77 per cent said No.

"Do you believe Congress should reform the income tax law to equalize the tax burden and eliminate loopholes?" he asked and 95 percent said Yes. The question is not specific and means nothing directly. It does mean that people are unhappy about the federal tax law.

To Norblad's question "Do you favor legislation to provide federal aid for school construction?" the vote was 41 per cent Yes and 59 per cent No. "Would you favor federal aid to raise teacher's salaries?" and on which 21 per cent said Yes and 79 percent said No.

If these two representatives of the people vote as the people want them to vote we may get cheaper—and less—government. We are certain that the people want that.

HOWARD BELTON

This writer has the privilege of being well acquainted with Howard Belton, Republican candidate for state treasurer. He is one of the most honest and conscientious men in public life in Oregon, mature, informed and anxious to perform a service for his adopted state.

AERIAL SPYING

The papers said the world was shocked when it was stated that this country had had a flyer shot down over Russia while flying a plane designed for high altitude picture taking.

There was no sense of shock in the persons who talked about the incident in our presence. Most seemed to realize that international spying was going on and many expressed a belief that Russia was spying on us from submarines or perhaps from the air also.

It may be international impoliteness to fly over another country and take pictures. To most Americans, if we judge correctly, it is hardly a misdemeanor and not worthy of more comment than the latest ball game.

FIRE TRUCK

The city council of Moro is seriously considering the purchase of a new fire truck and the reasons stated are roughly these: the present fire truck was partially paid for by contributions from farmers and is subject to call for fires in the country leaving the city temporarily without a fire truck; a new truck could have equipment better adapted to city use.

When it is considered that the council as presently constituted

seems bound to spend all or nearly all the money possible under the expanded six percent limit perhaps it may as well spend it for a fire truck as several of the other items in the proposed budget.

But we would like to have the thinking continued until some of these questions are answered: This being a neighborly community it can be expected that all fire equipment will be taken to all fires in town and out; fire protection for rural areas should be done by an agency able to levy a tax on those protected and if a rural fire protection district is not desired the county should be the government that provides the fire protection inasmuch as the county could levy a tax to pay for it while the city cannot; unless provision is made to take better care of equipment the deterioration of fire trucks is too great for suitable economy.

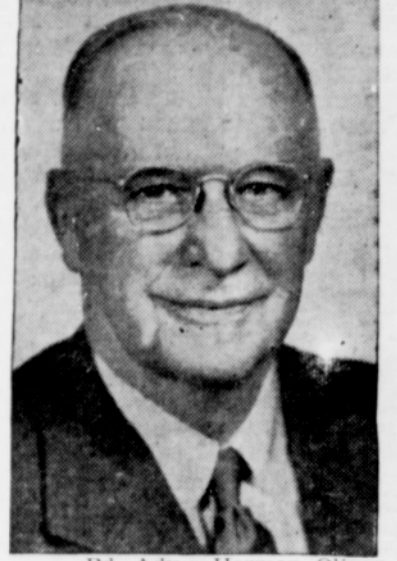
