SUMMIT AT BOTTOM

The sudden end of the long awaited summit conference was surprising even if the result was not. No one thought anything would come of it although Mr. Khushchev and Mr. McMillan had spent months building it up.

Denying knowledge of spying has been the thing to do even when the spy was caught red-handed and undoubtedly guilty. This time Eisenhower admitted it and gave the reason for it. Spying has been going on ever since the people of the world divided into nations and probably it will continue forever.

As for the conference itself it is no loss. The west had been plotting for months to prevent Khrushchev from getting power over Berlin and he knew he could not win. The frustration thus engendered was enough to make him ready to blow up the conference and the plane was a good excuse.

All this is generally understood and has been repeated over and over for three or four days. Such conferences are of little value and we entered into this one to please our allies and perhaps to soften Khrushchev. The plain fact is that we are not going to disarm and neither is Russia going to disarm. If and when each becomes completely confident in the honesty and good will of the other there may be some disarmament—but it will not be soon and a dozen conferences will not change it.

TV ELECTION

Congress has a bill to force television networks to give free time to political candidates in an effort to arrange a sort of Lincoln-Douglas debate by air. We think it a very foolish proposal. Viewers of TV are in search of entertainment unless they are watching sports or news and the latter can be had equally as well by radio. There is little assurance that such a debate would be heard unless it was the only thing on the air.

Then, too, there is no way to tell what a candidate will do when he is elected. What they say in the campaign has little to do with what they do after election. Those over 50 can remember a candidate who promised to cut federal expenses by twenty-five per cent and when elected spent money like a mad man starting an era of financial irresponsibility from which the nation may never recover.

Voters would be wiser to judge a man by what he has done than by what he says he would do and that is what he would get on television.

Camp Easter Seal at North Lake will open June 26 for children 7-11, July 9 for children 12-13, July 22 for children 14-17. Activities include swimming, fishing, boat riding, cook outs, nature study. The camp is for crippled children and sponsored by the Oregon society for them. There is a need for more equipment such as electric heaters, metal lawn chairs, bunk beds, knives, and forks, blankets, playing cards, games, piano music, which will be joyfully received and put to use.

ELECTION

We can recall no election in recent times that caused as little excitement as the Oregon primary that ends today. The Democrats, who have a campaign going on for presidential preferment, seem more appalled by the 88 candidates for convention delegates than excited by the race. The race is kept hot only by constant blowing on the embers by candidates and

newspapermen. Republicans have few contests and the warmest one of them entails some writing which serves to keep it pretty cool. It may be that voters are surfeited with promises, tired of the old arguments and blandishments and glad to have it over with so they can go back to work or whatever it is that interests them.

POLITICAL SECURITY

If congress passes either of the most prominent bills before it regarding additional medical care for oldsters it will be undercutting the social security program. The presumption embodied in that program is that people would pay in money in reasonable relation to what they took out. It was a sort of insurance program and, of course, those who died before 65 lost out which was dishonest because the deductions from wages was mandatory.

But either the Forand bill or the administration bill would give additional funds to those over 65, the Forand bill directly from the social security kitty and the administration bill from states and the federal government. No part of either would be paid by the recipients.

What is surprising is that younger people whose retirement fund would be tapped have not raised a howl about it. Either bill removes social security farther from the insurance ideal and puts it closer to political payments for a sizeable voting group. Either bill is dishonest.

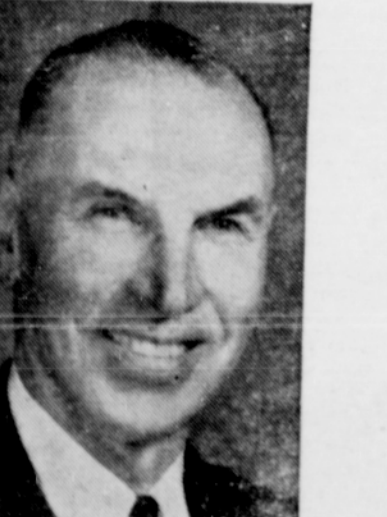
