**Many Students Earn Own Way**

Nearly half of the men students and about 10 per cent of the women at Oregon State college are paying "their own way" through college without parental help, according to a summary compiled by the registrar's office. Students are asked to check the percent of self-support on their registration forms.

Thirty percent of the coeds say they are at least half self-supporting and only about 1 out of 3 says she depends entirely on her parents for school expenses. Seventy-five percent of the men are at least half self-supporting, the summary showed.

It appears that almost any student who has the desire and the ability to go to college "can make it" if he or she is willing to make a real effort, college officials noted. A few students are working as many as 40 hours a week on the side from their studies and hundreds are holding down part-time jobs.

The college maintains an employment office as a service to students.
