KENT UNIT MEETS

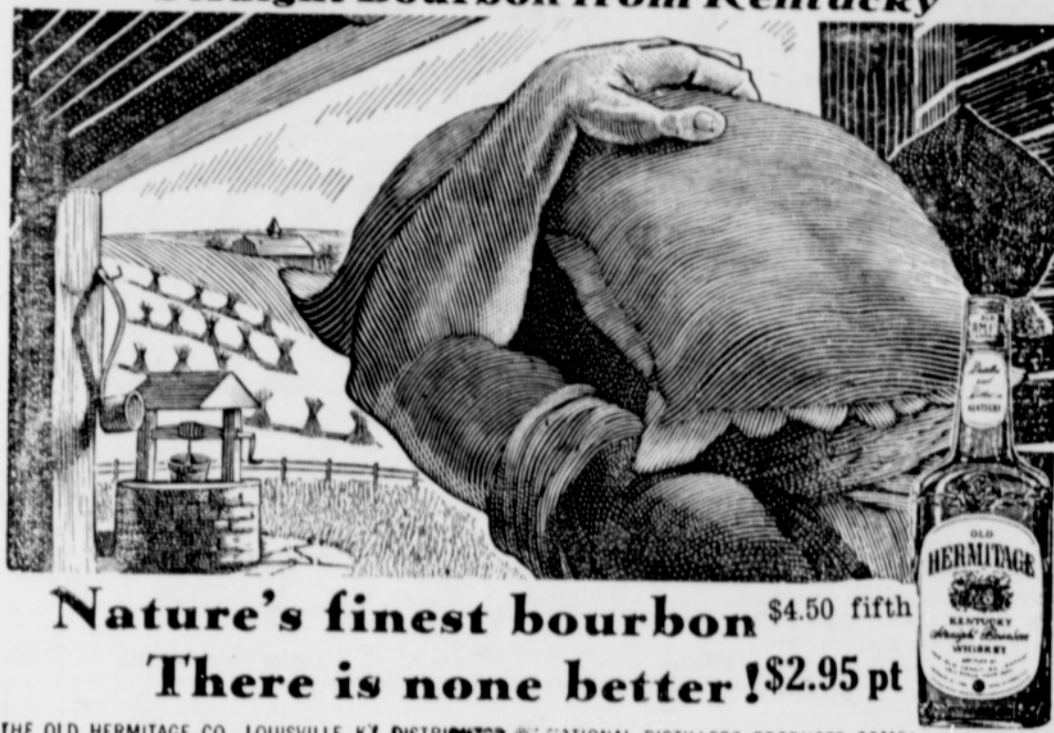
