County Agricultural Agents

Federal and state veterinarians report they can see a strong probability of eradication of brucellosis from the cattle and dairy herds in Oregon. Of the 44,000 cattle herds in the state, 300 were under quarantine in 1958 for brucellosis. At the present time 33 beef herds in Eastern Oregon and 7 in Western Oregon are under quarantine with 115 herds in the entire state for both dairy and beef. Only one herd in Sherman County and one in Gilliam are on the list as of May 1st. The Sherman herd is expected to be lifted this week following blood testing by Dr. George Marugg, federal veterinarian, The Dalles.

Semi-Dwarf Wheat
A tremendous interest now exists throughout the Northwest in the development of the semi-dwarf wheat now under test. The number of selections competing for release has been narrowed from thousands to a half dozen of the better types at the present time. One of these selections is on the increase in order to be prepared with adequate breeder seed in the event it appears worthy of release two or

more years from now. Another seedling of this same selection has been made to permit a commercial milling test in comparison with Brevor grown under identical conditions.

Selections of the semi-dwarf wheats are undergoing the same tests as did Omar. Consideration for release will follow the same pattern. The likely winner has yielded 20% more than Brevor on the average at several locations. It is very important to point out, however, that the superiority in yield is only in those maximum yield situations where Omar and Brevor lodge badly or produce excessive straw. Some increased yields have been noted by the semi-dwarfs at the Sherman branch experiment station. In general, however, the lower rainfall areas of the Columbia Basin such as Sherman County with less than 14 inches of rain fall it will offer little advantage over present varieties. In baking quality it appears in preliminary studies to be on a par with Golden. In milling quality it is about the same as Brevor.

The Best Hay Is Cut Early

Cutting hay early—when the forage approaches the peak stage of nutrient content—has been established as a timing principle giving all around advantage. Results at the Sherman branch station indicate that a good time to cut hay is blooming time of wheat. At this stage of growth the protein content is good, leafiness is better, and yield is good. As far as total nutrient content per acre there is none added as hay is cut after this time. Tonnage increases some but the nutrients are distributed over more pounds of feed making poorer quality hay. Hay cutting by bloom stage and saving of straw and chaff if additional forage is needed should find favor on additional Sherman ranches.

Pruning of Early Flowering Ornamentals

Early flowering ornamentals bear flowers on the new wood made last year. To get new flowering bearing wood for 1961 you need to prune off the old flowers after blooming.

With trees like flowering peach and apricot this means rather heavy cutting. Spireas should have the flowering wood cut back to a strong bud and weak growth removed. If there is still too much plant remove some of the older

canes down to the base.

Lilacs and azaleas start new flower buds directly below the old flowers and very soon after flowering. Old flowers only should be removed along with any weak or spindly growth.

As plants get too large a portion of the plant can be cut back severely each year until it is entirely renewed to a smaller size. By this method you have bloom and renewal at the same time.

Codling Moth Control in Apples

Wormy apples are caused by the larve stage of the codling moth. The larve enters the early stage of apple development at the time of petal fall and up to 9 or 12 weeks thereafter. Control can be achieved by spraying with a combination of DDT and malathion when the blossoms' petals have fallen and every three weeks thereafter for three or four applications. Excellent control should follow if this program is followed. A handy "Spray Schedule for Home Orchards" in the form of Extension Circular 631 is available.

White Top Control

White top, a perennial noxious weed which occurs in some locations in Sherman county can be controlled successfully with 2,4-D. Near eradication has been achieved in one application using two pounds of 2,4-D per acre with 25 or more gallons of water. Eradication of White Top is desired by the various agricultural groups and committees in the county. The Weed Council and County Court have requested eradication by all parties. Spraying time is at hand when the plant is in the bud stage.
