Cattlemen Have Problems In Hand

Sherman county cattle owners will not be required to do testing on the ranch for Bang's or TB to maintain accreditation in the future, Dr. M. B. Woulfe, assistant state veterinarian, told cattlemen Thursday evening at the county court house, during a general meeting of the Sherman Cattlemen's Association. Adoption of the trace back program is now possible with the low number of infested herds in the state.

Calf hood bang's vaccination was encouraged by Dr. Woulfe and other veterinarians from the disease eradication branch of

the USDA. Change over to the trace back program rather than ranch testing makes vaccination more important. Vets indicated vaccination needs to run 80% or more for replacement heifers. Dairy cattle under the new program will still need to be tested at least once every three years.

The Bang's vaccination program is becoming more important and adopted by various states. California as of July 1, 1961, will not accept any cattle for auction or shows that have not been vaccinated.

Starting July 1, all cattle going through Oregon auction yards will receive hip tags identifying the yard, animal and original owner. Blood testing will not be done at the yards according to Dr. Woulfe, unless cattle are of

unknown status or suspected infected cattle. All cattle going into slaughter will be blood sampled. On the farm, testing will be required only when reactors are picked up during the slaughter testing. This system should maintain sufficient numbers being tested to continue to accreditation program.

Beef heifers need to be vaccinated between 6 and 12 months of age. Vaccination is furnished by the state for this program.
