HIGHWAYS BUSIER

Oregon's highway traffic increased 3 per cent during May, 1960, compared to May 1959, according to the state highway department's traffic count recorded at 81 locations throughout the state.

Increases in traffic were general along most major routes with the greatest volumes recorded during the Memorial day week end.

The North Coast traffic showed general increase with traffic up 5.6 per cent at Gearhart and up 9.2 per cent at Otter Rock. Traffic volumes south of Newport showed a general decline during the month.

The entire length of highway US 30 reflected heavier travel with increases of 8.1 per cent at Rainier, 6.3 per cent at Troutdale, 11.6 per cent at Arlington, 5.6 per cent at North Powder and 3.1 per cent at Huntington.

Warmer weather along highway US 97 caused increased volumes along this route also. Traffic was up 16.5 per cent at Lava Butte, 8.1 per cent at Madras, 4.7 per cent at Chemult and 10.9 per cent at Wasco.

Oregon gasoline consumption increased 1.08 per cent during April, 1960, compared to April, 1959.

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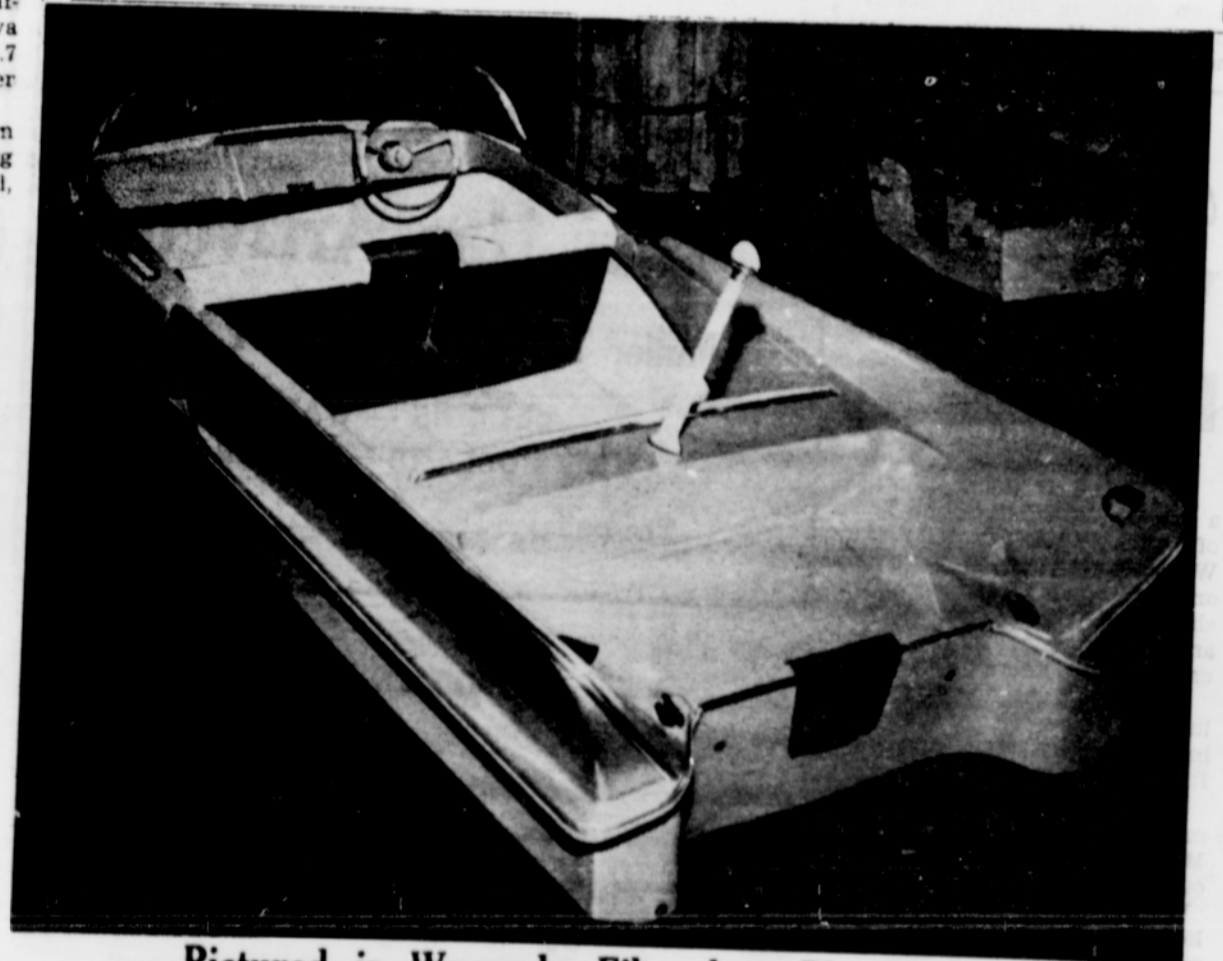
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
