Assessor, Appraiser To Go To School

County assessors and real estate appraisers from across Oregon will participate in the fifth annual state appraisal short course September 12-16 at OSC.

The course is sponsored jointly by the State Tax Commission and OSC to provide a continuous training program for appraisers and to help bring about greater uniformity in valuation of real property throughout the state.

Appraisal of residential property in or adjacent to commercial areas will draw special attention this year. Last year's related training covered effects of widespread development of outlying city shopping centers on downtown property values.

Effect of new farming techniques on the valuation of farm buildings also will be covered. Methods the appraiser should follow in measuring the amount of obsolescence in older farm construction will be explained in a series of lectures and workshops.

Practice appraisal of residential property in "changing neighborhoods" and of farm buildings will be included.

Dr. Grant E. Blanch, professor of agricultural economics at OSC, is short course director. Representatives of the Oregon County Assessors Association helped develop the program.

Martin D. Miller, Chicago realtor and former assessor of Cook County, Ill., will be one of the course leaders again this year. Charles Mack, chairman of the State Tax Commission, will give the opening address.
