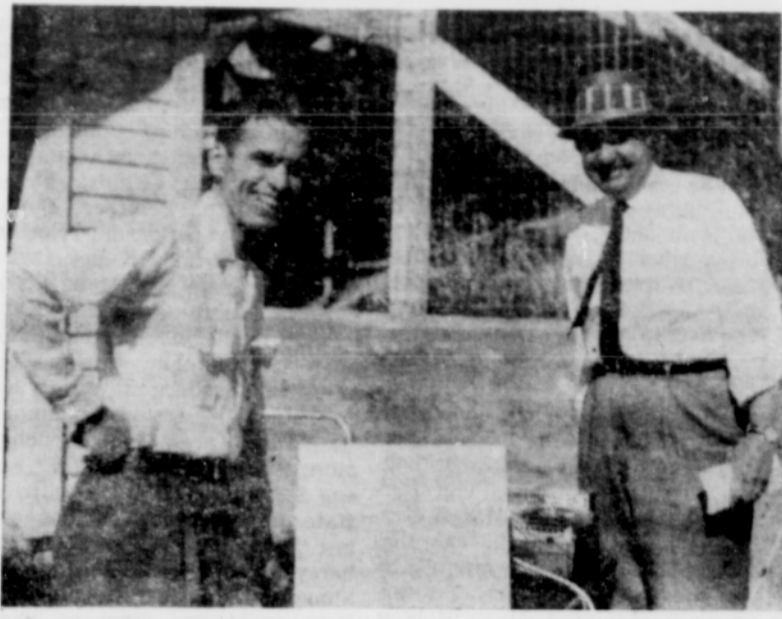

Mr. and Mrs. Otis Royse and daughter of Portland were guests recently of his mother, Mrs. August Royse and brother, Lloyd Royse and family.

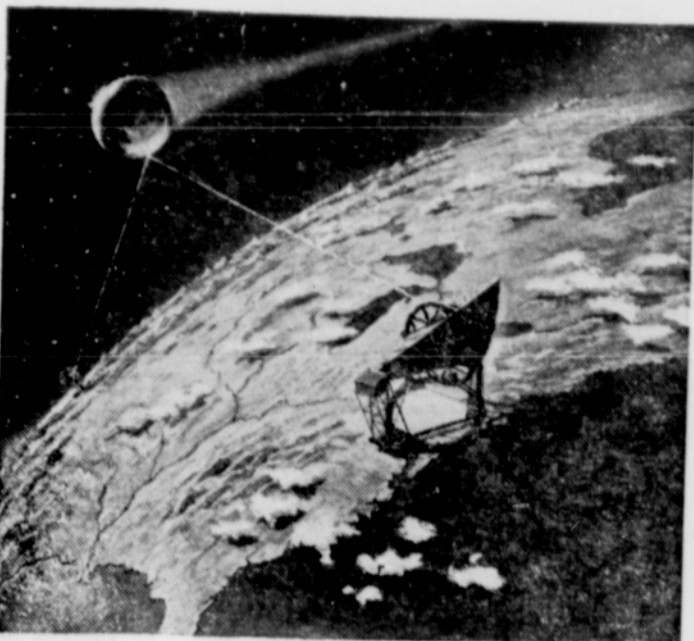

COMMUNICATIONS HISTORY
was made August 12 when a message taped by President Eisenhower was sent coast-to-coast via an artificial earth satellite. As shown in this artist's sketch, the message was sent from Jet Propulsion Laboratory (at left) in California. The high frequency microwaves bounced off the 100-foot diameter satellite 1000 miles above the earth, and were received at the Bell Telephone Laboratories at Morndel, New Jersey. The space communications experiment, known as Project Echo, is a joint venture of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, Bell Telephone Laboratories and the Jet Propulsion Laboratory. Since the first message was sent, two way phone conversations have been successfully relayed via the Echo satellite between New Jersey and California.

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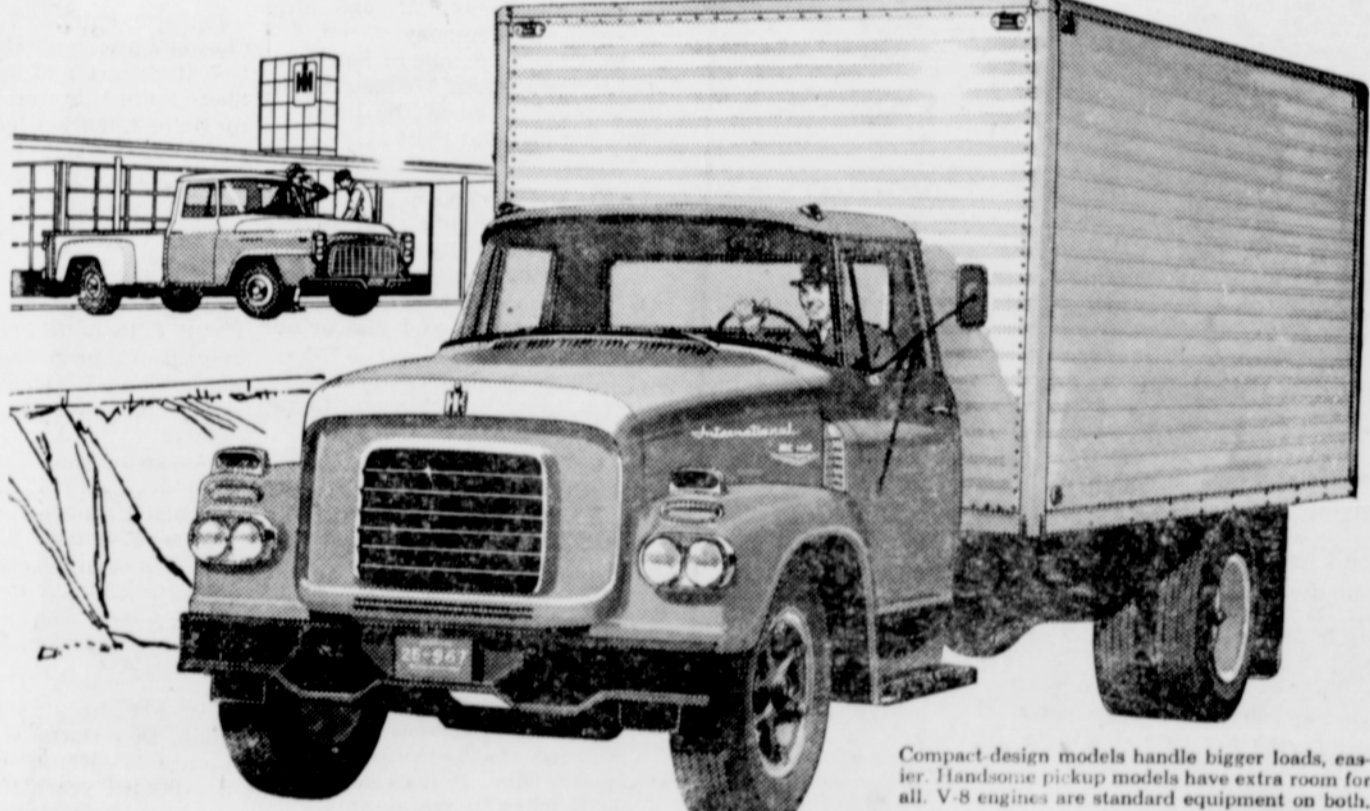
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
