#### Price of Food Goes On Up

Last year we paid, at retail-store prices, \$53.4 billion for foods that were grown on U. S. farms. This is not the total national grocery bill. It does not include non-farm foods such as fish and other seafoods, and it does not include imported foods—coffee, bananas, and the like. It does not include meals eaten at restaurants but it does include restaurant-purchased meals valued at retail-store prices. Nearly two-thirds of this bill, \$33.7 billion—was accounted for in getting the raw food product to the consumer, after it left the farm.

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### Cost of Selling More Than Producing

These higher food marketing er price tags on foods. But high er prices are only a part of the picture. Incomes, too, have been on the rise. Before the war, we spent about 23% of our disposable

income for food. Last year, with food prices up and more foods and more expensive foods in our diet, per capita food expenditures amounted to less than 21% of our spendable income. If we had bought before the war, our food bill last year would have added up to less than 15% of our spendable income.

In the past 10 years, our retail grocery bill for farm-produced foods climbed 42%. This retail bill is made up of (1) the farm value of the raw product, and (2) the cost of getting the foods from the grower to the consumer. During this same 10-year period, marketing charges went up 62% while the farm value of all farm-foods marketed rose only 16%. But our pockets were bulgier as our per capita incomes rose 50%. In 1949, we spent 24.5% of spendable income for foods. Ten years later we spent only 20.7% for food. And we're eating more and better than ever before.
