#### REMEMBER GRANDPA

Grandpa was that bent old gentleman with hard, rough hands and a simple philosophy in which two and two made four and who believed that it was sinful to eat bread that was uneared.

This newspaper is accused of talking too much about grandpa which is perhaps true for we have great respect for grandpa. Grandpa it was who worked and paid for the land that provides grandson's Cadillac.

Grandpa's thrift helped accumulate the funds to start many of our industries and built the schools that taught phenomenal scientists how to invent. We would not blame grandpa if he erred in what to invent.

Very few men who now enjoy the milk and honey of our successful agricultural economy ever paid for an acre of land. They inherited the land (and milk) from grandpa and Uncle Sam provides the honey. They, too, should respect grandpa whose hands became horny from handling a pitchfork or holding the lines over long strings of sweating horses thru cold spring summerfalling or late fall wheat hauling. Grandpa's calluses were honestly earned.

Newer generations have increased the production of the land far beyond the imagination or the ability of grandpa thanks to science and research—and the providence of nature which has been sending an extra two inches of rain since 1940.

What newer generations would do if they had to pay for the land will never be known. How they would stand up to money lender dictation, constant worry over interest payments, the mental hazard of being without funds is a serious question. We suspect many of them would take a job pumping gas.

But grandpa isn't to be remembered only for his stern resolution to pay his debts and own his land if it took his life to do it, which it often did. He is to be remembered for his adherence to his strict, and by modern definition, narrow, moral code. He did not quibble, nor fool around with what was honest and proper personal conduct. He knew what was right and he tried to do it.

The virtues necessary to the art of human living together are well known. Any of the major religions, any of the respected philosophers, tell of them. Lapses from them can be but temporary. We'll have to remember grandpa because what he did and believed fits those virtues.

#### LOYALTY

The two young men who left government employment in this country and went to Russia to help the communists against us are being analyzed these days and well they might. It is unfortunate that there is no known way to find out what sort of mental quirk might be in the heads of young men who obtain important jobs in the government.

Certainly if there was such a way to determine what such persons might do under stress Powers would not have been hired to make observation flights over Russia. He would have had to content himself with more prosaic jobs at more prosaic wages.

The two who defected were western boys who were abnormal in some way. We hope, anyway, that young men with so little loyalty are abnormal. Men of 30, with no home ties, can apparently be taught to believe anything and there is reason to believe will figure out something improbable in their own heads if not mentally occupied. There is apparently no direction the human brain can take the body if unrestrained by common sense, loyalty or decency.

Every one should have loyalty. Each must feel loyalty to family, home, county, state, country, school. Otherwise he is lost in a wide field without light to guide him and he may follow any gleam from any place. Russia is welcome to them as it is to the British traitors of a year or so ago. It will never get any good from them for there is none in them.

#### DR. TOWNSEND

Dr. Francis E. Townsend died last week at a ripe age above 90. His last years were active ones for he was enough of the originator of an old age pension scheme that it bore his name, and, because of its popularity, he had much to do with the errors in the present social security fiasco.

His scheme was that everyone over 65 should be compulsory retired and paid \$200 per month so that younger people could have jobs. That is probably the origin of where retirement at 65 came from and also the notion that retirement should be necessary before payments were made regardless of how much had been paid on the policy.

We think the good doctor did a dis-service to oldsters he was trying to help and also a dis-service to the nation. But, he was a kindly old man with friendly sentiments toward his fellow man. Like other do-gooders his intentions were far better than the results of his activity.

#### BILL BOARDS

The campaign to eliminate the bill boards along highways is warming up as publicity material is received from promoters of the measure. There may be as much talk about that as about some of the important measures on the ballot, and if so, it will have done a poor service to Oregonians.

We refuse to follow the lead of those who can get excited over petty matters of this kind. We don't think it makes much difference whether there are bill boards or not.

They certainly do hide some scenery and they certainly do hide some dumps. As advertising we doubt their value. By informing the traveler where he could find a hearty meal or a place to sleep, they do serve a purpose but as a place to advertise railroads, whiskey, shaving soap, we think the mood of a driver would be against billboard effectiveness.

As restrictive legislation we do not like the idea and shall vote our convictions. Putting one group of business men out of business for the benefit of other groups does not appeal to us. Telling anyone he can not do some accustomed thing that endangers no one or limits no one is something we do not like.

#### DRIED APPLE PIES

The other day while watching a man ingest a juicy apple pie the thought suddenly occurred that it has been years since we have seen or heard of a dried apple pie, that one-time staple dessert of the far country.

We doubt if the old single killed them, the one that ran: "Cut off my fingers, scratch out my eyes."

But don't feed me, dried apple pies. They were too durable for that. And come to think of it durable is a good adjective for dried apple pies. An apple when peeled, sliced and dried in the sun—as at first—acquired a certain rubbery texture that was not always removed in cooking—not if the cook was in a hurry to get back to the poker game.

We suspect that men baked more dried apple pies than women because the men were more often cooks in camps where fresh fruits were unavailable. Making a dried apple pie was a simple matter especially if the cook disdained to stew the apples first. Some dough, some apples, some sugar and cinnamon on Sunday and the job was done.

Don't see 'em anymore and rather happily, too. But they kept the beans and bacon, the camp bread and macaroni, from getting so monotonous.

#### School People Make Own Public Survey

It's a bit of grim irony that in 1960 federal financing for education has been gaining support in both the House and Senate of the U. S. Congress, the Chamber of Commerce of the United States reports.

For aroused people in thousands of school districts across the country have responded to the school needs of their districts in a magnificent way.

Federal office of Education reports show that current classroom shortages are the lowest in 25 years. The figures show that Americans built considerably more classrooms in the 1950's than the increasing school population required. (In fact, half the classrooms in use have been built since World War II.) Government surveys indicate that less than one per cent of school districts have used up their resources to

build more classrooms.

School enrollment increases in the last half of the '60's will be half the increases of the last half of the '50's, the National Chamber points out. The reason: the rise in birthrates during and after World War II leveled off in the 1950's. The number of new classrooms needed each year will drop.

Because of the efforts of an aroused public to meet school needs on a local level, if there ever was a school classroom emergency, it's over now, the Chamber says. But because the classroom building boom of the 1950's stirred imaginations, Congressmen are considering passing emergency legislation on a national level.

Ironically, the only emergency that there can possibly be is the emergency that would be created if the soundness of local education programs was imperilled by control from Washington.
