Baby pig anemia costs Oregon hog growers many dollars each year from baby pigs that die the first four weeks of age. Baby pigs are born with limited amounts of iron in their systems and due to the low iron content in the sows milk, iron must be supplied from some other source.

After pigs go on dry feed, anemia is no problem, but this generally does not take place until the pigs are about three weeks of age.

At present there are a number of injectable iron compounds on the market that will prevent baby pig anemia. These materials should be used as directed by the manufacturer. Most are given before pigs are three days old.

In some instances it is necessary to give a booster shot when pigs are about 14 days old.

Anemia is particularly common in pigs that are raised on concrete and wooden floors.

Oregon cattle producers can increase their income by doing a good job of sorting before cattle are offered for sale.

When a cattle buyer looks at a group of cattle, he sees only the off-colored and off-type individuals in the lot, and usually bases his price on the total group on these rejects.

Cattle should be sorted by size, color, and sex. Also put the horned cattle together by size so that buyers will see a uniform lot when they look at each group of cattle. Even the off-type and off-colored individuals will return more money because they are sorted out and look uniform.

This sorting procedure is done at the cooperative feeders sales over the state and it has aided materially in bringing higher returns to livestock producers that have consigned to these sales.

Young nursing pigs will start eating dry feed at about three weeks. This coincides with the maximum milk production of the sow which is about three weeks on pigs.

Following this time, pigs will make excellent growth if they are provided with some additional feed. Finely ground feed is not the best to use in the creep as pigs don't like finely ground feed. Coarser ground or pellet feeds seem to work to a better advantage than any other.

It is necessary to have a high protein content in a creep ration. At approximately 20 percent, and this protein should be made up largely of high-quality protein such as tagme, meat scrap, fish meal, or other animal sources.

Announcement of proposed rate reduction for grain moving to Portland was well received by Sherman County farmers. The reduction as presently printed would amount to about 3c per bushel on Sherman County grain moving west. This is a sizable saving for farmers amounting to about \$120,000 on an average crop.

The Oregon Wheat League has gone on record favoring this reduction schedule to go into effect September 30, 1960. Some indications are that a petition for suspension will be filed by other transportation groups. Farmers desiring to support the freight reduction may sign petitions to the Interstate Commerce Commission asking that a suspension not be given, at their local Cooperative Grain Grower offices at Wasco, Moro, and Grass Valley.
