Mr. and Mrs. Ben Hattrop left Sunday for their home in Portland after spending a week with their son, Kenneth Hattrop and family.

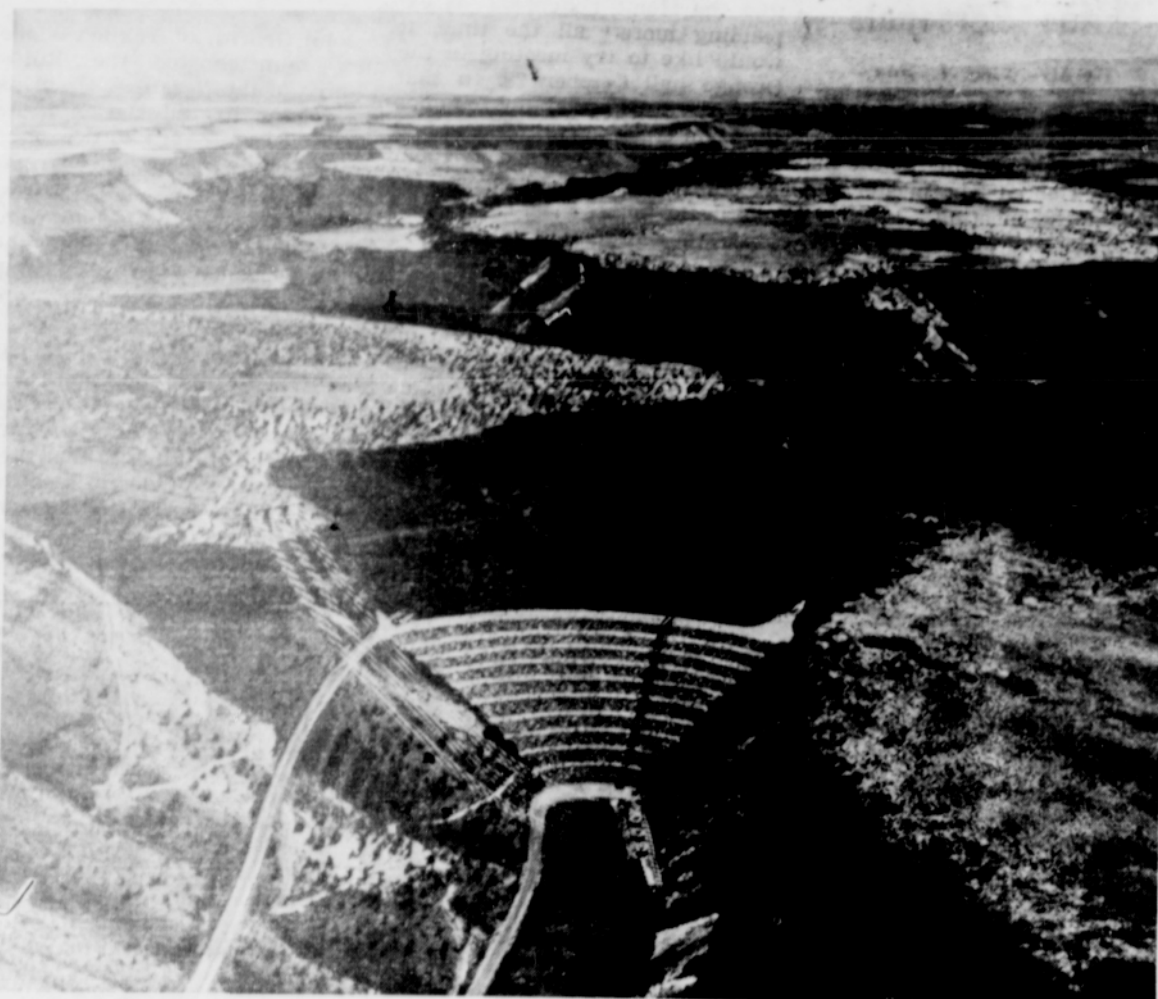
