Now There Is Club To Improve Beef Cattle

The Oregon Beef Cattle Improvement Assn. was organized to further the improvement of Oregon beef cattle by using a systematic production testing program. In order to carry out this program, certain practical and simple records must be kept. It is recognized that not every breeder wants exactly the same type of cattle. However, good-doing cattle, regardless of breed or type, have many of the same characteristics. This program is designed to identify the good-doing cattle that are of desirable type.

The program is setup to give equal consideration to weight for age and to conformation. Cattle should be weighed and graded as weaners, yearlings, and as long yearlings or two-year-olds. Of major importance is the calf weaning record. Cows and bulls are rated on the basis of the calves they produce. Most cattlemen are interested in both quality and quantity of calf produced. To successfully carry out the program, each animal must be permanently and individually identified and a set of scales provided to obtain weights. Additional information on the program is available in a mimeograph leaflet explaining the procedures of the program. The program is becoming more attractive each year to both producers and bull and feeder calf buyers.

Last week four Sherman County farmers were assisted in carrying out a portion of the program by weighing and grading for type and conformation of weaning calves. Purebred operators carrying on the program are Larry Kaseberg and Lloyd Henrichs. Bill Todd and Hans Bardenhagen, commercial operators, have also started a program of this nature. Other producers have shown interest in the program. Anyone that has their cows and calves identified and birthdates of calves for this year could get started on the program this fall. New Man Hired To Help OWGL



Winn Tuttle of Enterprise has been named administrator of the Oregon Wheat Commission, according to an announcement from Morris Wilson of Condon, newly-elected chairman of the commission.

For the past 10 years, Tuttle has been manager of the Willowa County Grain Growers in Enterprise and before that a warehouse examiner for the Administration of the U. S. Warehouse Act for 16 months.

The new administrator was born on a wheat ranch in Oklahoma. He received a Bachelor of Science degree in Agriculture from Panhandle A & M College in Goodwell, Okla., where he minor-ed in science and speech. He received his M. S. degree in Agricultural Economics from OSC in 1947, with a minor in marketing and a minor in economics.

Tuttle, 42, is married and has three children. He has been active in the Enterprise Chamber of Commerce, serving one year as president; the American Legion, Toastmasters International, the Future Farmers of America and the Oregon Wheat Growers League.

Tuttle will take over his duties as administrator on November 1 at the Oregon Wheat Commission office in Pendleton.

Morris Wilson of Condon was elected chairman of the Oregon Wheat Commission at its September meeting in Pendleton. Wilson, who was appointed to the commission in 1956, has been serving as vice-chairman. He also is vice-president of Western Wheat Associates of Portland, the foreign marketing organization for the wheat growers commissions of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, and a member of various county and state committees for the Oregon Wheat Growers League.

Other members of the Oregon Wheat Commission include: Rufus Schaad of La Grande; Kenneth Smouse of Ione, Water Shelby of Albany, and Floyd Root of Wasco. Root was appointed in July by Governor Mark O. Hatfield to succeed Paulen Kaseberg of Wasco, who resigned June 30 after 11 years on the commission. Root was elected vice-chairman.

One of County Agents Says Time to Kill Weed

There is still time this fall to treat those perennial weeds according to Martin Zimmerman, extension agent. TBA has proven to be one of the most effective materials for the control and eradication of many of these bothersome perennial weeds such as morning glory, Russian Knapweed, Canada thistle and others. Application should be made in the fall at the rate of 10 gallons per acre with 20 to 100 gallons of water.

TBA materials are taken into the plant primarily by the rooting system. Fall treatment is the most effective application time with winter moisture moving the material into the plant rooting zone. This material may be applied as long as weeds can be located and sufficient rainfall will come to move the chemical into the soil.

Cheatgrass Control Promise of Expert

Farmers of Sherman County learned of recommendation for the control of cheatgrass in wheat and barley land, Wednesday, September 28 at meetings held in Grass Valley and Wasco. Rex Warren, extension farm crops specialist from OSC outlined the newly approved practice to control and eradicate this bothersome weed. Also participating in the meetings were Bill Hall superintendent of the Sherman branch station and T. W. Thompson, county agent.

According to Warren, the practice employs the combination of two herbicide materials, 21 lbs. of 50% Amitrol and 2 lbs. of 2,4-D ester active material. The mixture is applied with a minimum of 5 gallons of water for air application and 10 gallons for ground application.

The spraying should be done only after a maximum number of cheatgrass seedlings have germinated, generally December 15 to January 15. Warren pointed out that this program is designed for use during the stubble year only and cannot be used during the wheat year.

This program eliminates all annual plants until approximately May 15 to June 1, thereby delaying need for tillage until growth reappears. The soil conditions at this time will promote better and easier tillage. Also this program can eliminate one or more summer tillage operations in addition to reducing the cheatgrass infestation. Cost of this program is about \$6.50 per acre for materials.

A program designed for cheatgrass and rye control in fence rows, roads and waste land according to Warren is the use of 4 lbs. of 80% atrazine and 3 lbs. of 50% amitrol with 10 gallons of water. This practice will eliminate annual plants for a period of about 12 months. Application can be made from January 15 to March 15. Application time may be extended from September to April with some modification. This program cannot be used on cropland.

Following the regular meeting, members remained to practice the degree work, which will be presented at the district convention to be held at Wasco October 29. Mr. and Mrs. Leo Watkins provided refreshments of cookies and coffee.
