SMITH FOR SENATOR

The race of United States senator from Oregon has attracted more than usual attention this year. Mrs. Neuberger got into the race immediately after the death of her husband and had an initial advantage because of what might be called the sympathy vote. Sentiment may not last until November 8 and, in any case, is not reason for choosing officials.

It is our observation that Mrs. Neuberger's attainments are not political and the senator, himself, was a better writer than senator and had more friends in writing circles. As a student of art or literature the lady would be far ahead of Elmo Smith. She is slight and feminine and interesting because of an active mind.

But we are electing a United States senator. All but one of the senators are men and basically it is a man's world and the battles are fought under man's rules. Mr. Smith is an aggressive man, filled with ambition which has kept him active and progressing since his adulthood. He works at his

job whatever it is. When he says he will try to get more things for Oregon he undoubtedly will for he knows how such things are done. And it has been years since an Oregon senator had any such ambition.

Mr. Smith has been expounding some sensible economics for a campaigner, although we do not agree with all of it. Mrs. Neuberger has held to the Democratic party line which is written by "liberals" of the ADA stripe back in Washington. It is a brand of economics thought to be politically appealing but entirely disconnected from fact.

Because Mr. Smith gives promise of being an active worker for Oregon with inclination to think for himself we think him a better bet than Mrs. Neuberger who merely echoes the party line which does not often coincide with Oregon aims or desires.

The argument of presidential candidates about Quemoy island is unfortunate. If Kennedy is elected the Communists will certainly move in on Quemoy feeling that they have a clear field. Then they would feel pretty certain of taking Berlin. How much do you suffer before putting a stop to being nibbled to death?

MEASURES

There are 15 measures on the ballots to be voted on November 8. Not all of them are important, but as long as we have the initiative and referendum voters are expected to do enough studying to pass on such things at each election.

No. 1 would set a new date for start of legislative office. Old legislators hold office until the first week in January and this will be increased to the start of the legislative term. Reasonable: Vote YES

No. 2 This is a daylight saving matter that has been before the

voters in one guise or another many times. Nothing that could be said would increase the knowledge of voters or change their prejudices.

No. 3 This is a scheme for financing new improvements. It assumes that the taxes on the value of such new improvements would be sufficient to pay for the improvement. We think the reasoning faulty and too filled with hope and recommend a NO vote.

No. 4 This amendment would permit indictment on an "information." It would save some time. However, the grand jury system was designed and has long served to protect the rights of the accused in criminal cases. Let us not

No. 5 A constitutional amendment to permit the legislature to write amendments to the whole constitution at once. Now it is restricted to one subject. The legislature is not the place to discuss constitutional amendments; that belongs in a constitutional convention where there are fewer other matters. Vote NO.

No. 6 This is the measure that has so excited the schools of higher education. It would give additional power to issue revenue bonds for the construction of housing for students. The record is good; the need is great; the bill should be passed.

permit visitors in Oregon with less than six months residence to vote for president. Affects few. Vote NO.

No. 8 This is a \$10,000,000 bond issue for state buildings. We don't need the buildings and have been able to build them out of current income, a practice that should be continued. Vote NO.

No. 9 This amendment would retire judges at 75. The record shows that elderly judges write the most opinions while young ones play the most golf. A better bill would be one to restrict the appointment of men to the bench before the age of 50. There is a place for age and wisdom. Vote NO.

No. 10 This is an outgrowth of the argument that ensued over who was to appoint the successor to Mark Hatfield then secretary of state and elective governor. The next time the matter comes up the other side will be in disagreement. The present law has been decided upon and clarified by the supreme court and should be kept. A new law would have to go through the same process to be as decisive. Vote NO.

No. 11 When the law permitting counties to achieve more home rule was written it did not include all the matter needed for financing new improvements. This additional matter is needed. Vote YES

No. 12 This is a constitutional amendment of the fearful and scared. If we get into an atomic war and if the west is bombed and if the state capital is destroyed

and if the governor and other officers are killed and if this law can be found, the people could set up a new government. A silly thing for a people who form a dozen new committees every month. Vote NO.

No. 13 This is a bill to continue and expand the veterans' bonding and loan. We think it has gone on long enough, that sufficient money is available to borrowers and the state had better get out of the loan business. Vote NO.

No. 14 This is in iniquitous tax increase of last spring that abolished the federal tax as an offset to state taxes. It was referred by the people and should be beaten by the people. Vote NO, Vote NO.
