Our Mill will be down the week of November 14 to November 21 for extensive changes:

1. Adding a 22 HP Steam Boiler that should double our steam rolling capacity.
2. Installation of an air lift from roller to loading out bins that will dry the steam rolled grain sufficiently so that it can be stored in bulk immediately.
3. Installation of a horizontal mixer so that we can mix all grains to customer's order.
4. A dial scale above the mixer so that accurate mixes can be made.
5. Other changes to improve speed and efficiency.

We are asking our customers to have enough grain rolled prior to November 14 so that we can be down for a week to ten days.
